## Hereford Meet Program Listed

The American Hereford Association's total performance records (TPR) testing program and the outlook for registered cattle breeders will be features of the Oregon State Hereford Association's annual congress at Oregon State University, Dec. 16 and 17.

J. C. Miller, OSU Animal Science Department head, will welcome the cattlemen to the campus and review recent beef research. Dr. James H. Jensen, president of the university, will speak at the Dec. 16 luncheon.

Later in the afternoon, differing opinions of the merits and influences of the show ring on the Hereford breed will be discussed. Panel members for this symposium will include Jim McClelland, manager of the Lost River Ranch, Klamath Falls and John Northum, owner of the A-L Ranch, Canyon City, the newly elected president of the Oregon Cattlemen's Association.

National breeders' associations will be represented by Orville Sweet, Kansas City, executive secretary of the American Polled Hereford Association, and John Jones, Kansas City, American Hereford Association.

Sweet will discuss the "Challenges of the Future for the Registered Breeders" and Jones will explain his group's TPR testing program.

Mrs. Lola Sather, OSU food technologist, will discuss "Quality Testing Your Product" and explain how testing panels examine variations within and between grades of beef. Cattlemen attending the meeting will have an opportunity to participate in the scientific meat testing and judging program carried on by the university.

State Veterinarian G. B. Rea will speak on anaplasmosis and Ralph Bogart, OSU animal scientist, will present some considerations in establishing closed herds.

A. T. Ralston, also of the OSU Animal Science Department, will summarize the Bonsma system of judging breeding stock for their functional utility.

Others will be elected at the Dec. 17 business meeting.

## Elk Season Over Except for Five Controlled Hunts

With the exception of five controlled hunts, the elk season is all over for the year and hunters will have to hang up their rifles until the fall of 1966.

November 28 marked the final week-end in the Rocky Mountain elk areas of eastern Oregon; the Roosevelt elk hunt west of U. S. Highway 97 closed November 14.

According to game officials, hunters found elk on the move during the last week of the season with success considerably better than at any time during the hunt. Storms throughout eastern Oregon pushed elk out of the high country or caused them to leave the confines of heavy pole thickets in search of food. Good hunting was reported from all areas.

Based on observations through the season, officials are of the opinion that the kill will be below the record take of last year, but comparable to previous years. Mild weather during much of the early part of the season made elk hunting extremely difficult.

Five controlled elk hunts remain on the calendar but are limited to those hunters who possess permits for the areas. These hunts include the Jewell Area, North Coast Agricultural Area, Gurdane, Shaw Mountain, and Troy. These hunts are scheduled for various dates in December and January.

Upland game bird season is also over except for chukar, Hungarian partridge, and valley and mountain quail in eastern Oregon. Chukar and partidge season extends through January 6 in eastern Oregon with bag limit six daily and 12 in possession. Quail season also goes through January 6 with bag limit 10 daily and 20 in possession.

## Ragged Mustangs Rally to Tip Savages

Showing little of the sparkle that marked Heppner High's district and state tournament basketball performance in the 1964-65 season, the Mustang basketball team opened their season with a 61-53 win over Enterprise on the Savage's floor Saturday night.

It took a second half comeback for the Heppner five to pull the game out of the fire after trailing at halftime, 26-24.

Coach Bob Clough said that his team was not impressive in the early season victory and showed raggedness, characteristic of a first game.

The gunner who came close to upsetting the Mustangs was Bill Ensminger of the Savages who peppered 27 points in the game. His running mate, Gary Rahn, had 17, but the two of them accounted for all but nine of the Enterprise points.

Gene Heliker, Heppner's 5-8 senior guard, got his scoring eye in focus and connected for 17 points. Mac Hoskins, 6-2 junior center, was second for the Mustangs with 13 points and led in rebounding. Jim Doherty, 5-10 junior guard, scored 10 completing the list of those in double figures. Other starters were Jim Jacobs, 6-0 junior forward, and David Clark, 6-0 senior forward.

It wasn't until late in the third quarter that the Mustangs pulled in front in the game, but as they started rolling in the final stanza they widened the gap to take the final eight point margin.

The Heppner jayvees had an easier time of it, holding a good lead throughout their game. Coach Jim Potter used reserves throughout about half the contest, and the losers cut the margin to the final 51-46 count.

## Harris Pine Mills Buys Ukiah Timber

Forest Supervisor Wright T. Mallory of the Umatilla National Forest announced today that North Fork Right of Way timber sale was sold November 18, 1965. The sale area is located on the Ukiah Ranger District in the North Fork John Day River drainage. It is located in both Umatilla and Grant counties.

The sale contains about 294,000 board feet of timber which was appraised at \$7,231. It was sold for \$7,654.50.

Harris Pine Mills was the successful bidder. Two bidders were present and a total of 15 oral bids were submitted. High bid prices per thousand board feet were \$32.40 for ponderosa pine and \$20.25 for Douglas-fir and other species.
