College Receives Grant of \$111,097 To Train Workers
Blue Mountain Community College won its second federal grant of the fall term with announcement that \$111,097 has been allocated to the college to train 132 unemployed or part-time workers.
Warren Cole, head of the college's new Manpower Development Training Act department, said the new program will get under way January 3 with nine new courses to be offered. The courses will be occupational preparatory classes designed to train heads of household for immediate employment.
Up to 20 additional instructors, four of whom will probably be full time, are now being hired. All of the students will be supported by funds under the Manpower Development Training Act and will carry full academic loads of 30-40 hours of classroom and laboratory work per week.
Earlier this fall BMCC was awarded a \$50,000 federal grant to study the college's preparatory program and to determine the effect of counseling. That program, developed by BMCC's Dr. Walter Palmberg after several years of research, was initiated here in the fall of 1963.
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Courses under the new program will run from nine weeks for welders to 30 weeks for the clerk-stenographers. Educational requirements to enter the program vary from a high school diploma to completion of six years of school. A 12-week basic education program will be conducted from January 3 to March 18 for trainees needing preparation for entry into the special programs.
The new courses to be offered under the program are:
Basic Education: Three sections running concurrently starting January 3 and terminating when students are sufficiently advanced to enter a skill training program. Entrance level, 6th grade.
Clerk-Stenographer: Thirty-week period beginning January 3 and ending August 12. Entrance level, high school graduate or equivalent. Basic education course not required.
Veterinary and Feedlot Technician: A 25-week vocational training program starting January 10 and ending July 1. Entrance level, high school graduate or equivalent. Basic education course not required.
Landscape Gardener: Twelve-week basic education course starting January 3 followed by 25-week vocational program ending September 16.
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Farm-hand general: Twelve weeks of basic education beginning January 3 and ending March 25. Running concurrently with the basic education course and continuing for eight weeks beyond it is a vocational program ending May 20. The course is arranged to allow for farm job opportunities.
Small engine repair: Twelve weeks of basic education beginning January 3 followed by a 15-week vocational program ending July 8.
Service station attendant: Twelve-week basic education course starting January 3 followed by eight-week vocational training course ending April 22.
Sales Clerk: Twelve-week basic education followed by 12-week vocational training program ending May 20.
Welding: Nine-week vocational training program beginning January 10 and ending March 11. No basic education course required. Entrance level, 8th grade.
Arrangements for entrance of trainees into the program will be handled by the Pendleton Branch, U. S. Employment Service.
