Although the game was at Sherman and was the Baby Mustang's first fray of the year, Heppner rebounded and defended fiercely to take a 28-8 half-time lead. The second half was much more even as frosh coach Don McClure substituted freely.

Topping Heppner was Calvin Ashbeck with 14 tallies while Mike Smith, with a hot outside shot, canned 13. Two Sherman boys hit double figures, Carlson with 14 and Bayes with 12.

Coach McClure praised several of his boys, stating that Calvin Ashbeck and Jon O'Donnell both did outstanding defensive and rebounding jobs. He also commented that Mike Smith helped break the game wide open with his fine shooting.

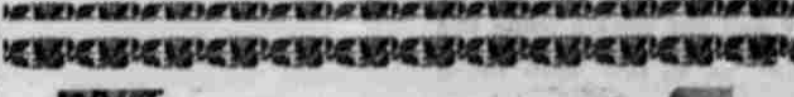
Tom Driscolls Spend Holidays in Heppner PA System Improved

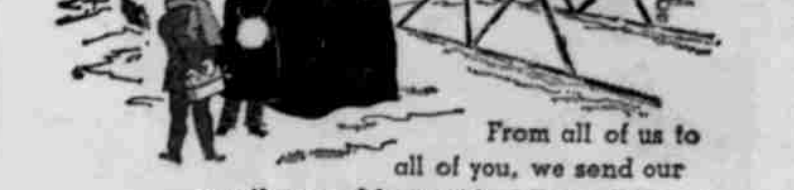

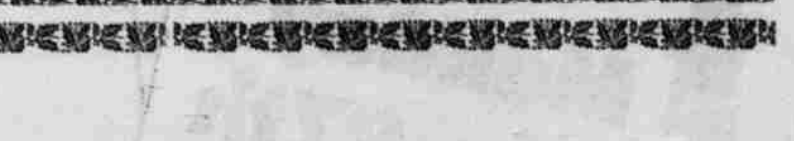
