Karen French Attains Honors as Heppner High's Homemaker

Karen Y. French, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond French, is this year's Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow for Heppner High school. She scored highest here in a written knowledge and attitude examination taken December 7. She is now eligible for state and national scholarship awards ranging from \$500 to \$5,000.

More than 570,000 senior girls in 14,714 of the nation's high schools were enrolled for the examination.

Test papers of all school winners in the state are being judged competitively. From them, the State Homemaker of Tomorrow will be named. She will receive a \$1,500 scholarship from General Mills, Inc., sponsor of the annual Betty Crocker contest. In addition, her school will be awarded a set of the Encyclopedia Britannica. The second-ranking girl will receive a \$500 educational grant.

Begun in the 1954-55 school year, the search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow is designed to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. This year's record enrollment pushes the 12-year total of participating girls near the 5 million mark. With the 1966 grants, total scholarship awards will exceed \$1.25 million.
