Time's Current Affairs Test, given this year to more than one million college and high school students in the U. S. and Canada, consists of 100 questions on national and foreign affairs. Also included are such categories as business, sports, entertainment, science, religion, literature and the arts.

The test, created for the Time education program—a classroom service of the magazine—has been taken by nearly 9,000,000 students since its inception 30 years ago.

Top scorers in each of the more than 5,000 classes enrolled in the education program receive a certificate from Bernhard M. Auer, publisher of Time.

Shooting a hot 51%, the Sherman jayvees stomped the Heppner jayvees, 54-39, in a preliminary basketball game before the varsity tilt in Heppner last Friday night.

The first period saw the Heppner boys take a 16-9 lead. This held up until 3:13 remaining in the second quarter when Sherman went ahead 20-19. Heppner's jayvees didn't make a field goal in the second quarter until Randy Stillman sank one with 1:48 remaining. The gun sounded at intermission with Sherman ahead 24-23.

In the third quarter Sherman overwhelmed the play, making only three ball control errors and building up a 39-32 lead.

In the final stanza both coaches put in their substitutes. Sherman outscored Heppner, 15-7, in the last period. The game ended 54-39, even though Sherman zoomed to 19 ball control errors.
