He was married to Lena Baker of Fairview on December 25, 1904, and in 1954 they celebrated their golden wedding anniversary. Mrs. Lundell passed away in 1964.

Mr. Lundell still maintains his home in Ione and drives his own car occasionally. He enjoys going downtown daily and visiting with friends he meets.
