As Rural Electric power the looms at Anadarko

Producing jobs and goods for a growing America is one of the problems high on our nation's agenda.

Helping develop new industries that will produce jobs and goods is one of the primary goals of the nation's consumer-owned rural electric systems.

New industries springing up all over the country, with the help of local rural electric, mean purchasing power and business in the billions spread across the country. Wholesalers, merchants, transportation and warehouse companies, farmers and professional people—all share in the wealth created by people at work.
