 Heppner High's Mustangs met disaster at The Dalles Friday night as the third place Wahtonka Eagles knocked them off, 58-55.
 Terry Way, Wahtonka's leading scorer this season, led 18 players with 18 counters followed closely by the Mustangs' Jim Jacobs and Gene Heliker with 15 points each. Bill Hammel, Wahtonka's 6'3" center, tallied 14 points while Jim Doherty, high-scoring guard, had double figure scoring for the Mustangs with 11. Dave Gray, a Mustang reserve, played much of the game and contributed four points to the Heppner cause. He also proved to be a top ball handler for the Mustangs.

Martin Johnson, who lived in Heppner many years ago, died in St. Louis, Mo., on February 20, according to information received by Mrs. Hannah Anderson.
 Johnson was born in Lonerock and graduated from Heppner High school in 1908. He married Odella Anderson, sister of Ben Anderson, late husband of Hannah Anderson. Mr. Johnson was a carpenter by trade.
 Surviving are two sons, Dr. Norton Johnson of Cincinnati, Ohio; Waldo Johnson of St. Louis, Mo.; and Mrs. Roger Hall of Columbia, Mo.
 Mrs. Anderson said she believed Mr. Johnson was 76 or 77 years of age. Services were Tuesday at St. Louis.

Formosa in Good Economic Shape, Speaker Reports

Despite its allegedly poor situation, the economic situation on the island of Formosa, Nationalist China, is very good, David Schaad of La Grande reported in talks to the Heppner-Morrow County Chamber of Commerce and the Soroptimist club here this week. He spoke to the Chamber Monday and to the Soroptimists Wednesday, illustrating his reports with colored slides.
 Schaad was International Farm Youth Exchange to Formosa (Taiwan) and lived with 10 farm families on the island for a total of 6½ months.
 He also spoke at a number of school and community meetings on a busy schedule while in the county from Monday through Wednesday.

Schaad said that Formosa presents a success story under the United States' economic aid program, and this aid has now been terminated because it is no longer needed.
 "It was used there to the best advantage," the speaker said.
 He described Taiwan as an island where land is very scarce, very valuable and "every bit" of it is used.
 Among principal agricultural products are rice, sweet potatoes, rice straw, sugar cane and tea. Growing season is so fast that an intercropping season is used to grow perhaps two or three different crops on the same land each season.
 Water buffalo is a principal beast of burden, but there is some modern equipment used in farming, such as small tractors.
 Some 12,000,000 persons live on the island which has an area similar in size to that of Harney county in Oregon. There is a standing army of 600,000 men, Schaad said.
 Residents are very sanitation and health conscious, and every person takes a bath every day without exception.
 The speaker was introduced by Gail McCarty at the Chamber of Commerce meeting and by Gene Winters at the Soroptimist meeting.

This Important
Oregon Humane Law
 With the Amendment by Rep. James A. Redden was signed by the Governor and is reprinted here as a courtesy by the ANIMAL DEFENDERS' LEAGUE, INC., OF PORTLAND, OREGON:

Relating to animals; amending ORS 167.740.
 Be It Enacted by the People of the State of Oregon:
 Section 1. ORS 167.740 is amended to read:
 167.740. (1) Any person who overdrives, overloads, drives when overloaded, overworks, tortures, torments, deprives of necessary sustenance, cruelly beats, mutilates or cruelly kills, or causes or procures such cruel treatment of ANY ANIMAL, or who, having the charge or custody of any animal as owner, or otherwise, inflicts cruelty upon the animal, shall, upon conviction, be punished for every such offense by imprisonment in the county jail not exceeding 60 days, or by a fine not exceeding \$100, or both.
 (2) Every owner or person having the charge or custody of ANY ANIMAL, who cruelly drives or works the animal when unfit for labor, or cruelly abandons the animal, or carries or causes the animal to be carried in or upon any vehicle or otherwise, in a cruel, inhumane manner, or knowingly or wilfully authorizes or permits the animal to be subjected to torture, suffering, or cruelty of any kind, SHALL BE PUNISHED for EACH AND EVERY OFFENSE in the manner provided in subsection (1) of this section.
 (3) Every owner or person having the charge or custody of any DOG, CAT, HOUSEHOLD PET or HORSE, who deprives such dog, cat, household pet or horse of necessary and adequate FOOD, DRINK, AIR, LIGHT, SPACE, SHELTER** and REASONABLE PROTECTION FROM THE WEATHER, shall be punished for each and every offense in the manner provided in subsection (1) of this section.
 * Includes sufficient EXERCISE for the animal's health and happiness.
 ** SHELTER means a CLEAN, DRY COMFORTABLE BED, FREE FROM DRAFTS AND THE ELEMENTS; if a dog house it must be raised on its 4 corners out of wet and mud, steady, level, rain-proof, solidly built without slivers or nail-ends protruding, and preferably so the animal can see out when inside. NEVER tie an animal on a short rope, chain, OR SO ANY TIE-LINE CAN GET TANGLED. A swivel-chain with "corkscrew" sunk in the ground or an over-head "runner" is best. BE THOUGHTFUL FOR YOUR PET'S COMFORT. THERE IS NO PERCENTAGE IN KEEPING ANY ANIMAL UNDER NEGLECT WHEN YOU CAN GIVE IT A KIND, HAPPY, PERMANENT HOME WHERE IT CAN ENJOY ITS LIFE.
