Prineville Slates Agate Cup Races For August 18-21

Come August 18-21 the juniper-clad hills around Prineville Lake, which once rang with the warwhoops of marauding Palutes, will resound to the shrill whine of racing hydroplanes as the National Stock Outboard Championship Races get underway in the Agate Cup Regatta at Prineville.

Staged as a community benefit by a non-profit corporation formed specifically for the purpose, the races have received the official sanction of the American Power Boat Association, beating out such places as Miami, Fla., and Beaver, Penn.

Officers of the Agate Cup said groundwork is being laid to make sure this will be an event long remembered in racing circles with expansion of the pit area at Jasper Point and entertainment etc. already being planned.

The Regatta is named for the unique trophies which are specially designed and constructed of famed Central Oregon agate, petrified wood and other semi-precious stones. Each of the nine championship trophies is valued at over \$300 with the Agate Cup itself, to be given to the top driver in the nation at the close of the races, carrying a \$1,000 price tag.

The Regatta is in the midst of a month-long stretch of activity which opens with a combination five-day race meet and and Paulina Rodeo, the latter known as the wildest, swiftest thing that has happened in this county since Jasper Chief Paulina gave non-union haircuts to white men.
