Two new stamps will be on sale soon at the local post office according to Flossie Coats, postmaster. The first one, an 8-center, portraying Albert Einstein, the 4th in the "Prominent Americans" series of regular stamps, will be first placed on sale through the Princeton, N. J. post office March 14. It will go on sale here March 15.

The second one, a 5-cent Mi-

gratory Bird treaty commemorative stamp, will be first placed on sale at Pittsburgh, Pa. March 16 in conjunction with the North American Wildlife and Natural Resources Conference. Red, blue and black in color, it commemorates the 50th anniversary of the treaty that protects migratory birds in Canada and the United States. It goes on sale here March 17.

Medicare Signup Deadline Nearing

Those who are age 65 and over have only until March 31 to make application for benefits under Medicare, Vernon A. Welch, district manager of Social Security, La Grande, announces.

"Those people not yet retired should take special note at this time," he said. "They are entitled to these benefits regardless of the fact that they continue to work but only if they make application before the deadline."

Social Security will have extended hours on Tuesday, March 15, in the Pendleton Post Office building. Open hours will be from 9 a.m. until 8 p.m. to allow everyone to make application for Medicare benefits.

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
