

Coach Don McClure Lists 30 on Track Team

A squad of 30 track men, including 15 lettermen, will be out for the sport this season at Heppner High school, Coach Don McClure reports.

Among top prospects, based on previous performances, are the following:

Mark Brown, senior, 3-year letterman, who scored third in the sub-district in the 2 mile and holds the school record in that event in a time of 10:32.2.

Tim Smith, junior, 1-year letterman, who was third in the district in the 2-mile and was third in the district in cross country this school year.

Tim Driscoll, senior, 3-year letterman, first in the district in the 880 and third in the state in the 880, and holder of school records in the 440 at 53.0, the 880 at 1:59.3, and the broad jump at 20'11".

Dave Hall, sophomore, 1-year letterman, fifth in the district in the high hurdles last year.

Jim Jacobs, junior, who won second in the sub-district in the shotput and sixth in the district in the shotput.

Mickey Kindle, senior, 1-year letterman, who won second in the sub-district in the pole vault and holds the school record in the pole vault at 11'4".

Ken Morgan, senior, 2-year letterman, who won a third in the sub-district in low hurdles.

Hold That Shovel! Engineers Warn Amateur Diggers

Uncle Sam is very much against "pot hunting" on Government lands, and has laws to prevent such digging.

Amateur archeologists, and Indian relic searchers are again warned by the Walla Walla District, Corps of Engineers, of Federal laws pertaining to such digs which will be strictly enforced.

The law prohibits excavating, destroying, or appropriating historical objects on lands owned or controlled by the U. S. Government, and the Corps states it will be followed on the Lower Snake River, where construction is in progress on the Lower Monumental, Little Goose, and Lower Granite Dam projects.

According to professional archeologists, removal of Indian artifacts by amateurs can result in total loss of very valuable scientific information.

The U. S. National Park Service plans to send an archeological team from Washington State University to conduct several excavations at the sites this summer.

The National Antiquities Act cites the penalties for destroying such historic or prehistoric material. "Any person who shall appropriate, excavate, injure, or destroy any historic or prehistoric ruin or monument, or any object of antiquity, situated on lands owned or controlled by the Government of the United States, without permission of the Secretary of the Department having jurisdiction over the lands shall, upon conviction, be fined the sum of not more than \$500, or be imprisoned for a period of not more than ninety days."
