## 'Question 7,' Dramatic Movie, Due for Showing

"Question 7," a timely motion picture of life in East Germany, will be seen here by special showing on Sunday night, March 20, at the Heppner Elementary school multipurpose room at 7 p.m.

The motion picture is sponsored by the South Morrow Ministerial association and arrangements for it were made by the Hope and Valby Lutheran churches.

The public is invited to the showing without charge, and refreshments will be served to those attending by ladies of the Lutheran churches.

The title, "Question 7," refers to a questionnaire that children in East German public schools are forced to answer before they can continue with advanced studies. Only those whose answers are politically reliable are chosen. Thus the questionnaire becomes a supreme test for a boy who is forced to choose between what is easy and expedient and what is right and honorable.

Incidents depicted in "Question 7" are true and are based on interviews with thousands of refugees who have fled to West Germany and hundreds more still remaining behind in East Germany.

The picture, which features prominent European actors, has won 22 major awards and has been selected "best film of the year" by the National Board of Review. It was shot on location in West Germany within sight of the East Zone guard towers and in Berlin before the Brandenburg Gate.

## Adoption Picture Changes; Many Now Need Homes

Long delays that once were experienced when a couple sought to adopt a child are no longer the rule, Mrs. Jean Reid of the State Department of Welfare told audiences at the Heppner-Morrow County Chamber of Commerce and the lone Lions club in meetings Monday. She was guest speaker at the Chamber at a noon luncheon and at the Lions club at a dinner meeting.

Mrs. Reid, whose job it is to find homes for adoptive children, said that as of January there were some 140 children available for adoption through the welfare department.

"We need more families now," she said, adding that the adoption process can be completed in two or three months.

Particularly sought are couples who can provide warmth, love and understanding for the adopted children. Wealth and home ownership no longer have any bearing on adoption, the need only being to find a couple which is financially responsible, she said.

Those considering adoption of a child should be capable of good parenthood, be interested in children and be capable of raising them to maturity.

Since 1959 the state department has placed some 700 children for adoption and currently is finding homes at the rate of 15 to 20 per month.

Two methods of adoption are possible in this state, one being done independently with perhaps an attorney handling the matter and the other through the agency. One big advantage of the latter, Mrs. Reid said, is that the child is not placed in the county where his natural parents live. His parents' identity and the identity of his adoptive parents are never known by each other.

Only about 5% of the adoptions fail, she said. Children of all ages are available for adoption although placement is not too successful after they have attained the ages of 8 or 9.

No costs are involved in the adoption process for the parents taking a child from the agency, Mrs. Reid said.

At the Lions club she presented a motion picture film, "Angel by the Hand," showing the child's need for love and home care.

"A mother and father are basic equipment for most kids," she said.

"Our biggest problem is finding new homes for these children. Do you know of one?"

Mrs. Reid said that it is hoped that by making appeals in various parts of the state more homes may be found for the adoptive children. Her appearances here were through arrangement of Lowell Chally, welfare administrator.
