



SINCE COMING to Morrow County in 1952 to become manager of Morrow County Grain Growers, Inc., Al Lamb played a very important role in the development of the grain industry, not only here but throughout the northwest. He was influential in the North Pacific Grain Growers and was a past president of the managers association of North Pacific. ONE OF THE most significant and interesting experiences of Al Lamb's later life was participating on the Central Africa Trade Mission of the U. S. Department of Commerce in May, 1962. A highlight of the trip was a visit with the late Dr. Albert Schweitzer at Lambarene, French Equatorial Africa.
