Meetings and interviewing prospective teachers took much of the time of Supt. David Potter of Morrow county schools during spring vacation week.

He was in Portland on Monday, March 14, to attend a meeting called on the proposed realignment of intermediate education districts in the state and to join with other superintendents in presenting suggestions and recommendations on the matter.

At other times Monday and on Tuesday he interviewed prospective teachers offered through college placement bureaus in Portland and he also attended portions of the Oregon Education association meeting in Portland.

On Friday, with Athletic Director Bob Clough of Heppner High, he attended a meeting of the Oregon School Activities Association in Portland relative to the matter of changing the Greater Oregon League setup to a round robin schedule between all teams both east and west.

On Monday the superintendent and Clough went to La Grande where Potter attended an afternoon meeting on Title IV of Public Law 89-10 relative to the establishment of regional educational laboratories, which are available to school districts.
