

Mrs. Rachel Dick Gets Fellowship

Mrs. Rachel Dick, journalism teacher at Heppner High school, has been awarded a summer study fellowship in journalism at the University of Oregon by The Newspaper Fund, Inc. It was announced Wednesday.

She is one of 251 high school and junior college teachers in the nation to receive such a fellowship for the coming summer and one of 11 in the State of Oregon to be chosen.

Mrs. Dick will attend the session at the University of Oregon from July 11 to 29.

Grants from The Newspaper Fund provide tuition, board, room, textbooks and, in some cases, travel expenses.

The teachers, all school newspaper advisors from 43 states and the District of Columbia, will attend graduate-level seminars designed to assist them in supervising the work of student journalists.

The seminar that Mrs. Dick will attend is one of nine scheduled for five campuses, others being at Marquette University, University of Minnesota, Syracuse University and University of Texas.

The Newspaper Fund was established to encourage young people toward careers in journalism. This phase of its program is based on the assumption that better school publications will attract bright young minds with interest in better communications.

Budget Hearing Proves Quiet Session

tained for some \$3000, and also under consideration is the possibility of working out a cooperative laundry plan with the hospital.

Jack Grossnickle, elementary principal, pointed out that he had investigated various types of laundry equipment and the kind that would be needed to best provide for the heavy usage for the two schools would consist of three heavy duty units, a washer, extractor (or tumbler) and dryer. The extractor cuts drying time in half, it was explained.

Laundry for the two schools has been a heavy expense to this time, and Grossnickle said that he would compile some figures on this expense for release to the public.

Also in the budget under capital outlay is the item of \$8000 for improvement of the Morgan street extension to Heppner High school, the main route to the school. This would provide for sidewalks and curbs, and the balance of the cost of surfacing the street would be paid by the state under a plan provided by the state highway commission to provide relief within limits of small cities where heavy and unusual use of a street brings extra wear.

City of Heppner has reapplied for the funds of the matching basis with the understanding that the school district would assume the cost for the walks and curbing if an agreement is reached with the state. These would be on property owned by the school district going to the bottom of the hill. When the matter was first proposed, total cost was set at \$26,000 of which the state would pay all but \$8000.

Also in the capital outlay section are items for remodeling the reading room at Heppner High, adding acoustical tile to the high school gymnasium ceiling (\$3200) and adding ceiling tile in the gym at Heppner elementary (\$1500).

Pool Repair Planned
There is another item in the maintenance section to provide \$1000 for repairs to the lone swimming pool, which was hard hit in last winter's flooding. Sandblasting and painting is needed, the superintendent said.

The budget also includes an additional \$1000 for school annuals as a change in policy on financing these traditional publications. They were previously supported by donations from businessmen (advertising) but

the board during the year voted to aid in their support from district funds and eliminate this burden on private enterprises and individuals.

The budget calls for total requirements in the general fund of \$1,081,801 as compared with \$1,042,285 for the current year. The principal reasons for the increases being in the three categories outlined by Supt. Potter.

Election April 12
Budget election is scheduled for Tuesday, April 12, throughout the district.

Copies of the budget in detail are available from the county school office, and the superintendent said that a copy will be mailed to anyone interested. Those wishing copies are invited to telephone the school office.

The superintendent also states that he will be glad to speak at any meeting on the budget or explain any item upon which a person may wish clarification.
