## Measles Vaccine To Be Available For Preschoolers

Measles vaccine, to be offered without charge for the immunizing materials, will be available within a few weeks to Oregon children of preschool age. It was announced last week by Dr. Richard H. Wilcox, State Health Officer.

He said that the type to be distributed through the Oregon Immunization Program for use by private physicians and local health departments will be the Edmonston strain of live, attenuated measles virus vaccine, plus gamma globulin.

It is the recommendation of the American Academy of Pediatrics that this type of vaccine be administered only to children aged 12 months and older.

One dose is expected to confer immunity. Dr. Wilcox stated that a three-year controlled study of 290 children immunized with live, attenuated vaccine plus gamma globulin has been conducted by the New York University School of Medicine. Although many were exposed to measles at home and at school, not a single case of measles has appeared among the vaccinated children.

During 1966, Oregon is scheduled to receive 60,000 doses of vaccine plus gamma globulin. Requests by private physicians for these materials will be handled by local health departments in the same manner that vaccines for prevention of polio and DPT are now being distributed through the Oregon Immunization Program, Dr. Wilcox said.

Reported cases of measles in Oregon during 1964 and 1965 totaled more than 13,000. This figure is believed to represent about 10 percent of the actual number of measles victims.

"We know that there have been six deaths due to measles during the past two years," Dr. Wilcox said. "But equally tragic to unknown scores of families are severe complications that leave children permanently handicapped by sensory damage."

Dr. Wilcox urged families to plan on obtaining this immunization care from their own physicians wherever possible.
