Ione Post Office Construction Set

John F. and Cora M. Soward of Madras are successful bidders at the construction of a new postal facility in Ione. It is announced by the Post Office Department.

The new post office will contain 906 square feet of interior floor space, with an 80 square foot platform and 2000 square feet of parking and maneuvering area. The basic lease term will be five years with three 5-year renewal options.

The building will be located on lots 7 and 8, Sperry's second addition. It is not announced when the post office will start nor when the post office is expected to be completed.
