Mustangs Rank Third at Burns Invitational Meet

The Heppner cindermen took third place in the Burns Invitational track meet last Saturday, as they were once again tipped by the large, strong squads from Burns and Madras.

Although official meet results have not yet been received from Burns, it is known that Mickey Kindle broke his HHS pole vault record once again by soaring 12'3". Kindle still had to settle for second place, though, while speedster Tim Driscoll took home the only Mustang blue ribbon. Driscoll's first place 2:01 in the 880-yard run was complemented by his second place 10.3 in the 100-yard dash, and a third place broad jump.

Other top Mustangs scoring points included Tim Smith, second in the two-mile and Simon Winters scored in the 440. Mark Brown and Tim Tullis took third and fourth in the mile.

The outstanding record of the day was achieved by the Hilllanders' Butch Kinder. His 55' 8 1/4" shot put effort is probably the best in the state so far this year. Another Burns boy, Haarlund Yriarte, whipped the discus 162'3", which is also among the best in the state records this year.
