Auto Registrations Up 68,000 in 1964

Oregon motor vehicle registrations at the end of 1965 totaled 1,228,156, an increase of 5.9 over 1964. Vern L. Hill, director of the Department of Motor Vehicles, announced recently.

This meant that another 68,873 vehicles joined the Oregon traffic stream during the year. Hill noted that the rate of increase last year was not quite as great as in 1964 when a 6.2 per cent registration gain over 1963 was recorded.

Registrations over the past five years, he added, have increased nearly 27 per cent.

A breakdown of registrations shows 1,027,841 passenger cars, 1,890 buses, 71,342 trucks, 90,073 trailers, 3,585 fixed loads, and 33,435 motorcycles.

Motorcycles again showed a big gain 13.7 per cent more than in 1964, but the rate of increase was lower than in other recent years.

The department, Hill said, collected \$21,068,843 for all types of registration and driver licensing transactions in 1965.

Moneys collected are earmarked for the Highway Fund, except for department expenditures.
