Youth Make Good Showing at State Junior Olympics

About 65 Morrow county students from Irrigon, Boardman, Ione and Heppner schools participated in the Oregon Junior Olympics competition in Portland Saturday, June 4. The meet was held in good weather at the Franklin High school athletic field; it began at 9 a.m. and was over by 1 p.m.

The Morrow county delegation made a very strong showing with the girls winning six gold medals and the boys five gold medals and one second besides other high places. None entered from the county placed below 15th in the state.

Eighth grader Lee Huson of Heppner, won a gold medal in the heel and toe walk for 380 yards, with a state record time of 4 minutes, 20 seconds.

Dave Hall, also of Heppner, won a senior division gold medal in the 120-yard low hurdles with a time of 13.7 seconds.

Donna Pummell of Irrigon won the girls 75-yard dash in 8.7 seconds. All the girls who ran in this race bettered the state record.

The senior girls relay team, Heppner, composed of Merilee Jacobs, Louella Roark, Linda Heath and Vicki Robinson won a bronze medal in the 440-yard relay. Pamela Hughes won a fifth place in the 30-yard low hurdles and Brenda Steagall won a fifth place in the 30-pound shot put.

Jamie Smith of Heppner just missed a gold medal in the junior division of the heel and toe walk. She was ahead of the field when she broke the required step and was disqualified in the last 20 yards of the race.

Eddie Sherman of Ione was fifth in the senior 100-yard dash.
