Range Camp Open To Applicants

Oregon Youth Range Management Camp, under the direction of the American Society of Range Management, Pacific Northwest Section, and Oregon State Extension Service, will be held August 7 to August 13. Camp is located at the Lake Creek Recreation Association, Inc. facilities, Logan Valley, near Seneca, Oregon.

J. G. Stephens and Robert Benson, county chairmen for this year's camp, report that the Range Camp is presently restricted to four sponsored boys between 14 and 17 years of age in each county. The aim of the camp is to acquaint these boys, who in future years may be our business and agricultural leaders, with proper maintenance and use of our vast natural resources.

Although this is a national program, many local civic groups, individuals and federal agencies contribute to making the camp program successful.

In 1965, there were 60 boys from 20 Oregon counties attending the camp. The boys representing Morrow county at last year's camp were Earl Struckmeier and Jimmy McElligott. These boys were sponsored at the camp by Heppner Chamber of Commerce, Morrow County Livestock Growers, Heppner Soil Conservation District and Morrow County Farm Bureau.
