Budget Approved For Parks District

IRRIGON—A hearing on the Fiscal Year 1967 budget for the Irrigon Park and Recreation Maintenance District preceded the June council meeting. The park hearing was conducted by chairman Orville Buchanan and Coy Reed.

There were no objections, and the budget passed, with the following resolution: Resolved that the Park and Recreation Maintenance District adopt budget approved by the Budget Committee on May 25, 1966, for FY 1967, levying taxes in the amount of \$1,107.27 and appropriating funds in the amount of \$1,150.00.

Mayor Wilson presided over the Council meeting that followed. The council voted to award a contract to Earl Glidewell, CPA, for the annual audit of the books, as required by law. The council also authorized that \$2,000.00 of the city checking account be transferred to a savings account in order to earn interest on the working capital.

A contract was awarded to Leon Kennedy providing for the city to pay a fee of \$29.00 a month for disposal service. Kennedy will cover refuse once a week between May and November and once every other week the remainder of the year. The contract was negotiated directly between the City of Irrigon and Mr. Kennedy, rather than through the Landfill Association.

some school district in the state having a controversy about a particular book that was required reading, or was found in a school library. The selection of books and materials for a school presents a real problem for the school board and, in turn, the staff. The administration is proposing to the Morrow County School Board that a policy be established governing the selection of materials. In this proposal we spell out the legal responsibility, the delegated responsibility and a proposed philosophy on book selection.

"It is the function of the school library to encourage young people to locate, use and evaluate relevant materials of instruction as they identify and analyze significant contemporary problems and form judgment about them. It is a basic duty of the school library to make available materials of sound literary quality and authority."

We then list eight sets of criteria for the selection of books and materials. The last portion of the policy spells out the procedures for handling criticism concerning a particular book or piece of material.

This procedure is as follows: (1) Criticism will be submitted in writing. (2) The School Board will be informed of such criticism. (3) A committee will be appointed to study the allegations, the librarian will always be a member of this committee. (4) The book or material will be withdrawn immediately from circulation until a decision in writing is submitted by the committee. (5) Appeals regarding the decision may be made through the Superintendent to the Board of Education.
