### House Bid Call Approved

Taking note of the critical need for teaching housing in Boardman and Lone, the board authorized calling for bids on one house each in Boardman and Lone and on a duplex in Boardman.

Those occupying present houses in Boardman must be out by December 31 by order of the Corps of Engineers. The district has plans drawn for the houses and the duplex, and the board authorized one change on the house plans to enlarge the dining room by cutting the garage space from a double to single garage.

A lot has yet to be purchased for the house in Lone, but the building committee was authorized to buy a lot there. Principal Beggs and his family will live in the house when it is completed.

Teachers will rent the district-owned housing from the district.

### Library Policy Approved

A policy for the selection of library books, as previously outlined by Supt. Potter, was approved by the board, and a report of the transportation committee, outlining some of the bus runs for the coming year, was approved.

A committee on special education recommended that work-study programs be established in every high school in the county for special students. For those students needing special education that is unavailable in the county, the committee requested that the board adopt a policy that the district may pay up to \$250 per year for education of the students out of the county. The recommendations of the committee were approved.

The board designated Witherell, Witherell and Morrison as auditors for the 1966-67 school year and designated Supt. Potter as budget officer.

Next regular meeting of the board will be August 15.

## Doctor Takes Post As Medical Officer In Tehama County

Dr. C. M. Wagner, who expects to close his medical-surgical practice in Heppner in August, has accepted a position as county medical officer and health officer in Tehama county, Calif., he said Monday.

He will hold this position while also conducting private practice at Red Bluff, Calif., he said.

Dr. Wagner will be in Heppner on Tuesday's and Wednesday's of each week for the rest of this month to keep scheduled appointments with patients and for part of the month of August.

As county medical officer, he was introduced to the Board of Supervisors at the Tehama General Hospital, Red Bluff, on July 5 by Louis Nedopad administrator. Dr. Wagner has signed a one-year contract at a salary of \$20,000 according to a story in the Red Bluff Daily News of July 6.

One of the problems confronting him will be the low caseload at the hospital which has concerned officials of the county there. The paper reported that the caseload had dropped to the "lowest point in memory" but under Medicare has "risen sharply."

Dr. Wagner said he had no definite knowledge of any other doctor planning to come to Heppner following his leaving here. He makes the trip to and from Red Bluff by air.

"This is the fastest insurance payment in our history," Mrs. Wyman reported.

Medicare patients have been running from 50 to 70% of the total care at the local hospital since the plan was started July 1, with the patients staying a week or longer.

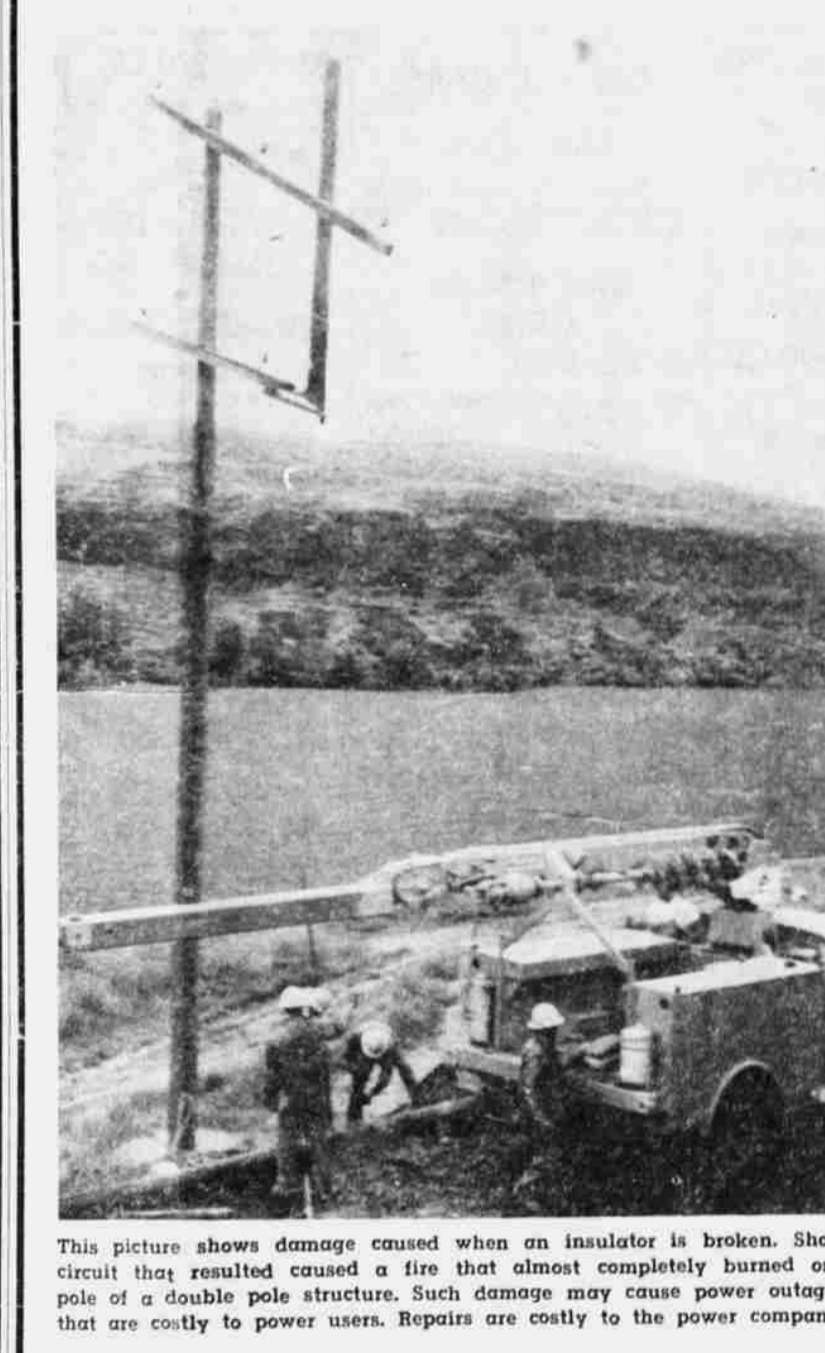
