Two New Rest Areas Ready at Boardman

A veritable oasis in the desert greets the weary traveler along Interstate 80N with the opening of the safety rest areas approximately two miles west of Boardman, it is announced by Forrest Cooper, state highway engineer.

There are two units, one serving eastbound traffic and the other westbound. The development includes a water system, rest rooms, and shelters on either side covering picnic tables. Extensive tree planting is underway as well as the planting of grass.

There will be ample parking areas with separate locations for cars and trucks. Both areas will be totally developed.

It is interesting to note that Boardman is one of the pioneer areas in highway beautification in Oregon. It was here that Samuel H. Boardman, who later became the state's first parks superintendent, started planting trees along the roadside shortly after the turn of the century and later made plantings and seedlings available to other areas.

A newly married couple told us a sad tale about signing an agreement to pay \$300 for a vacuum cleaner. They wanted to get out of the deal after they thought the matter over because they couldn't afford it and didn't really need or want it at this time.

The salesman who came to their door offered them \$25 for each sale he made to their friends if they would help him make appointments. Two of these friends signed contracts also.

After they looked around, they realized they could buy a good vacuum cleaner in local stores for about half that amount.

Beating Methods Important For Getting Fluffy Cakes

You'll get fluffier cake batter and more volume with a portable electric mixer if you move the beaters around the bowl in the same direction all the time. If you start going clockwise, don't reverse in the middle of the job.

Lily Johnson, home economist with a large appliance manufacturer, visited the Oregon State University campus recently and explained that beaters are designed to whip air into the batter. When you switch directions, the tiny air bubbles are broken. The same applies to whipping cream or any other mixing job.

Fast Treatment Removes Grease Stains on Wash-Wear

Have trouble with grease spots on wash and wear or permanent press garments? The trick is to treat stains right away if you can.

Some stubborn grease spots come out when treated with a paste of all-purpose detergent and water. Apply this directly to the stain. The secret to removal is to allow the solution sufficient time to penetrate. Let it soak overnight, then wash in hot water.

College Includes Dental Program

Blue Mountain Community College has assumed full control and support of its dental assistant training program, President Wallace W. McCrae announced last week.

The program was established two years ago under the Manpower Development Training Act of 1963 as a cooperative effort with Blue Mountain Community College and the State Employment Service. Twenty-two dental assistants graduated from the nine-month course during the first two years.

The college board of directors approved integration of the program into the college curriculum and directed a survey be conducted to determine if any changes in course offerings were advisable. Dr. Kenneth Miller, chairman of the department of dental assistants, will conduct the survey.

"Blue Mountain Community College has the only accredited dental assistant training program in Eastern Oregon or Eastern Washington," President McCrae explained, "and we intend not only to support it but to upgrade it where necessary."

He said he expected Dr. Miller to complete his survey late this summer, after which a decision will be made as to whether the program is to continue at its present level or be expanded. Applications for admission into the program should be sent to Blue Mountain Community College, Pendleton.
