The 1966 Umatilla County Fair will have an added attraction during the afternoons of August 12 and 13 by presenting its first rodeo—an accredited event approved by Western States Junior Rodeo Association—to be held in a new arena boasting some of the latest and most modern rodeo stock handling equipment and facilities. These facilities, when completed, will be R.C.A. accredited for all approved rodeo events, adult and junior.

"The junior rodeo will replace the afternoon horseshow program which was sponsored for many years by the faithful Sage Riders," Kem Tellefson, county fair board chairman, said. "The many hours the Sage Riders members spent organizing and conducting the horse show contributed to a very important part of the fair," he added.

According to WSJRA rules, junior rodeo events may be entered by any boy or girl between the ages of nine and 18 years. Points will count toward season awards providing the contestant's WSJRA dues are paid. No entry will be accepted without the \$2.50 fee for \$10 deductible accident insurance.

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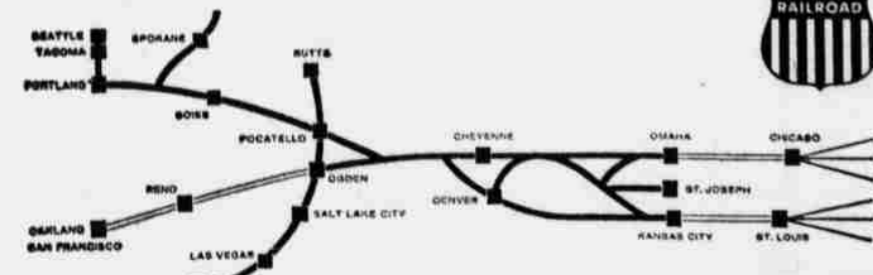


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
