TO ALL PERSONS INTERESTED IN THE CONSTRUCTION OR USE OF RANGE IMPROVEMENTS ON PUBLIC LANDS ADMINISTERED BY THE BUREAU OF LAND MANAGEMENT, DEPARTMENT OF THE INTERIOR

Range improvements located on public lands must be authorized under cooperative agreement or permit. Such improvements must be consistent with multiple use needs.

Any range improvement constructed upon public land, without prior written authorization as required by the regulations, will subject grazing leases, licenses or permits to cancellation or reduction in accordance with 43 CFR, 4113.1, 4113.2-1, 4113.2-3, 4122.4, and 4122.6.

Range users who believe that they may have a valid interest in an unauthorized range improvement have the opportunity to apply for authorization not later than September 30, 1966. Authorization for the improvements may be granted if it is determined a valid interest exists and the improvements meet multiple use requirements. Any modification to the improvement specified by BLM will be a condition to the authorization.

After September 30, 1966, all unauthorized range improvements found on public lands will be considered property of the United States, or will be ordered removed in whole or in part by the person or persons responsible for the construction.

Applications for permits for range improvements may be obtained from the District Office of the Bureau of Land Management in Baker, Oregon.

Volumes Increase In City Library

Number of books in the Heppner Public Library has been increased to 5,736 from 5,565 listed in 1965, annual report presented to the city council by Marion Green, library president, shows.

There are now 3,557 adult volumes in the library and 2,179 juvenile books. A total of 96 adult books was added during the year and 33 were withdrawn. At the same time 127 juvenile books were added and 19 were withdrawn.

Circulation for the year showed that 7,099 books were loaned for use outside the library, including 3,491 adult volumes and 3,608 juvenile volumes, as well as 167 unbound periodicals.

Twenty-one periodicals are received in the library, including one by paid subscription and 18 by gift, and one newspaper is received by gift.

Receipts for the year totaled \$218,884, including a \$1600 donation of city funds, provided in the city budget; \$50 from the Elks; \$100 in miscellaneous donations; and \$62.80 in memorials. Operating expenditures totaled \$166,279.

Budget for the coming fiscal year is set at \$200,000. Blanche Brown is librarian, and the library is open 11 hours per week, four each on Mondays and Wednesdays and three on Saturdays.

Besides Green, officers of the library board are Mrs. Lucy Peterson, vice president; Mrs. Nora Turner, secretary-treasurer; and Mrs. Charles Starks and Clarence Baker, trustees.

Green told the council that another director needs to be appointed to fill a vacancy on the board.
