Effective New Weed Chemicals Need Precaution

New herbicide materials now available for use on American farms do a far better job of controlling weeds than ever before, but they also require a lot more care and good common sense.

Modern herbicides work well to control weeds when used correctly. Used incorrectly they may damage desirable plants.

Weed control chemicals now are much sharper tools than they used to be. And like fine tools, should be used with the care and respect due them.

Take for example, Trodon herbicide. An entirely new chemical material which is about twenty times as effective as 2,4-D. This means it will solve lots of problems 2,4-D won't touch. It also means that if used incorrectly you can do a lot more damage.

Users of agriculture chemicals should always read the label carefully and follow its recommendations precisely. The labels on the herbicide containers are written with great care to state only facts. It tells first what the herbicide is, it tells the amount of active ingredients in the product. The label also makes recommendations for use and gives rates and time of application. Certain warnings are stated when necessary for precautions to be taken.

The Tordon label as an example lists restrictions for use on cropland and the time of planting broad leaved and grass family plants. A portion of the label reads "... For spot treatment of crop land, remove area actually treated from grazing and crop production as residues may result. NOTE: Do not plant grass crops used for food, feed or grazing until two years after last application."

Other herbicides have similar instructions for use.

Dividends to Stock Feeder
The livestock producer who has his forage tested for protein usually finds that the practice pays dividends. Making up a feeding ration by using standard "book" feed values can be often costly. The forage analysis test pro-

NOTICE IS HEREBY GIVEN that the undersigned as Administrator of the Estate of J. A. Graybeal, deceased, has filed his Final Account and Report in said Estate and the Court at Oregon State University has shown that protein content of alfalfa hay varies from 9 to 22 percent. If the livestock feeder uses the standard value of 16 percent protein and feeds 22 percent protein hay, he is wasting a lot of valuable protein.
On the other hand, the feeder who is using low protein alfalfa hay in a ration and figuring it at the standard 16 percent, could boost his production considerably by adding a protein supplement.
The forage testing service is available through the county extension office. The extension agent will provide containers and instructions for taking forage samples. The sample is sent to the forage testing laboratory on the OSU campus, and the results are returned directly to the grower.
The majority of requests for forage testing come from repeat customers, which indicates that growers are gaining some useful information from the tests. The test results include moisture content and crude protein, which can be converted to digestible protein and total digestible nutrients through use of appropriate tables. Charge is \$4.50 for hay samples, \$5.00 for silage samples.

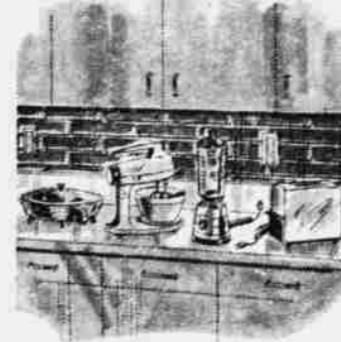
