Everett Thoren, GOP Candidate, Visits at Fair

Everett Thoren of Elgin, Republican candidate for U. S. Congress from the second district of Oregon, spent Tuesday and Wednesday at the Morrow county fair meeting and greeting people in the interests of his campaign.

He announced Wednesday that Mrs. Mervin (Gena) Leonard of Lexington has accepted county chairmanship of his campaign, and she will be assisted by others whose names will be announced later.

Thoren, who opposes incumbent Al Ullman, Democrat, for the congressional post, said that he received a very good reception from those with whom he visited at the fair.

A sawmill owner, Thoren and his wife have eight children. He has been active in Boy Scouts, the Nazarene Church, Columbia River development, Chamber of Commerce, and is a member of post No. 140, American Legion. He is a combat war veteran.

Thoren's platform includes: 1. Keeping Eastern Oregon's Congressional district from reapportionment by the Big City Bosses. 2. An effective foreign policy of firmness and strength. 3. Preserving the purchasing power of the dollar for the benefit of fixed income citizens such as senior citizens and pensioners. 4. Stopping of foreign giveaways and excessive Federal spending. 5. Fighting for constitutional rights of citizens.

The Elgin man said that he would welcome the opportunity to meet his opponent on any platform and said that he would donate \$50 to any organization which could arrange for such a meeting.

Thoren unsuccessfully opposed Congressman Ullman in the 1964 election.
