

# Herb Hynds Return From Alaska Trip

They went to Fairbanks and spent a day at the Golden Days festival, where they saw seal skinning and the famous "blanket toss." At Anchorage, where they went next, they visited Mrs. Hynd's cousin, Howard McDuffy. They traveled to the Kenai Peninsula and spent four days on the Russian River, where Herb had some excellent salmon fishing. At Seward they visited the halibut cold storage plant, where the fish is prepared for cold storage and then shipped out. In Valdez they called on Mr. and Mrs. Ray Huddleston and Sally. Here they saw the city in the process of moving five miles back from the original site because of the earthquake. They cleared customs back into Canada to get out to Haines, Alaska, again, where the Chilkot Indian Dances were being held. At this location are a few old Indians who still make blankets from goat hair, Dahl sheep wool, and reeds.

From Haines they took the ferry on the inland passage to Ketchikan, where fishing for red snapper was good. After two days the family left for Prince Rupert and went back to Prince George. They then drove down to the state of Washington and stopped at Kittitas to visit a niece and family, Mrs. John Clerk, Jr. Their son, Jack Clerk, returned to Cecil with the family for a visit with relatives.

The Hynds thoroughly enjoyed their trip, but were all pleased to be back in Oregon, where lettuce is cheaper than 79c a head as it had been in Alaska.

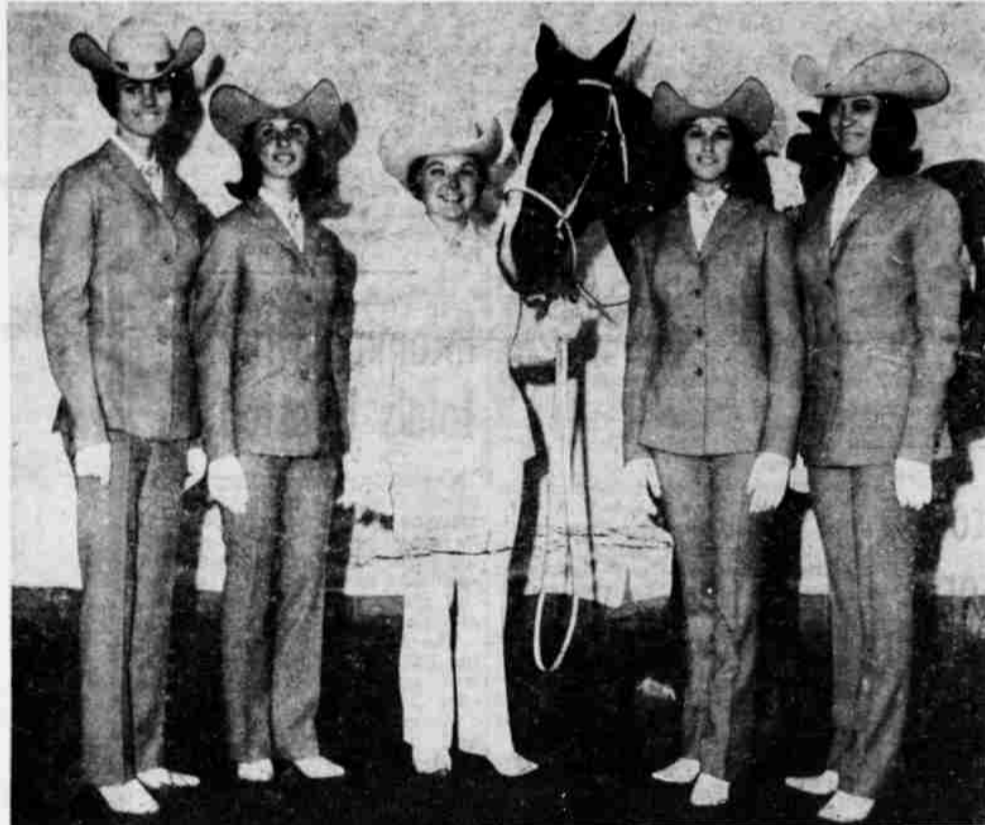
"Both locally and nationally, July is the fifth successive month to show impressive gains in U. S. Savings Bonds sales over 1965," Morrow County Savings Bonds Chairman John Venard announced here today in his monthly report to county residents.

"County-wide sales totaled \$4,903 during the month, contributing to the state record of \$3,280,354 as compared with July sales in the state a year ago of \$2,780,287, the chairman reported.

July Savings Bonds sales in Oregon show an increase of almost 18 percent over a year ago. Oregon's sales for the first seven months this year totaled \$20,334,243, an increase of 11 percent over 1965.

"Nationally, E Bond sales are setting postwar records, with July sales at \$411 million, for both E and H Bonds, six percent higher than July of 1965. The cash value of E and H Bonds outstanding at the end of July is \$49,798 million, as compared with \$49,894 million in July of last year."
