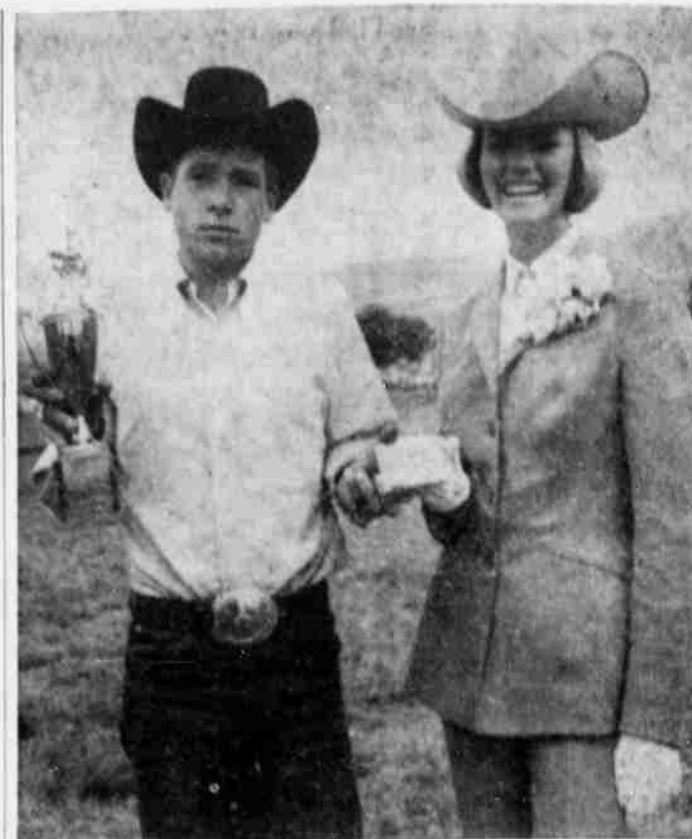
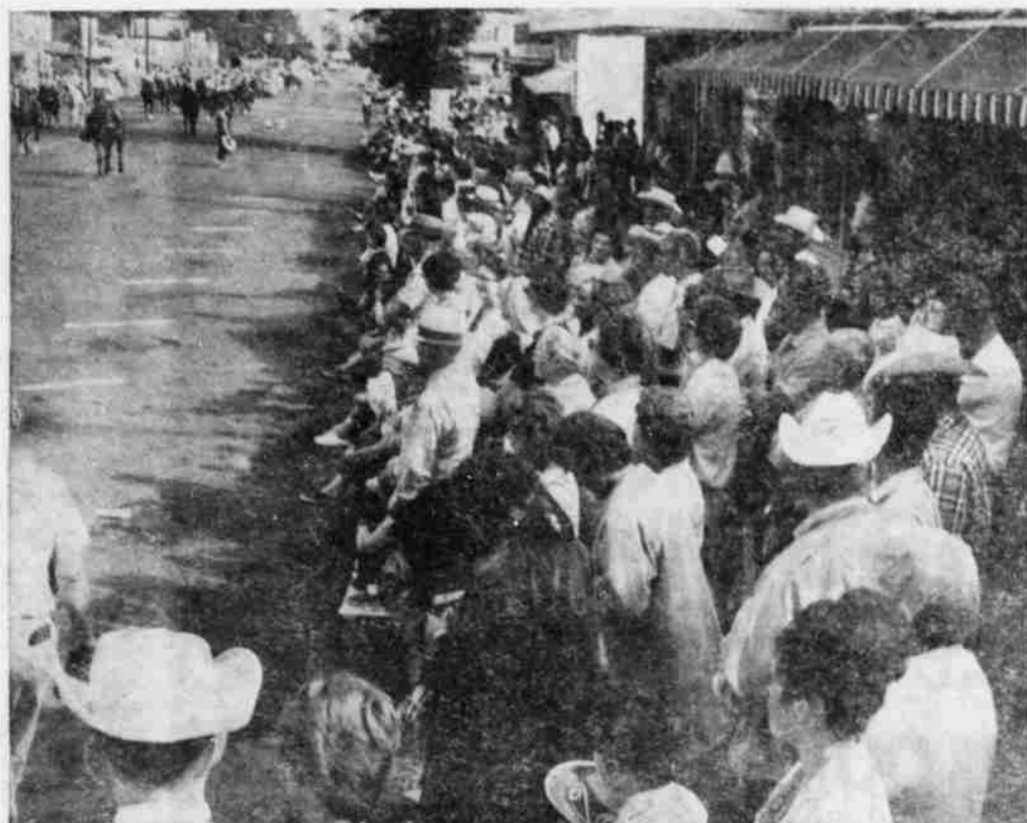


Photos Show Highlights Of 1966 Morrow County

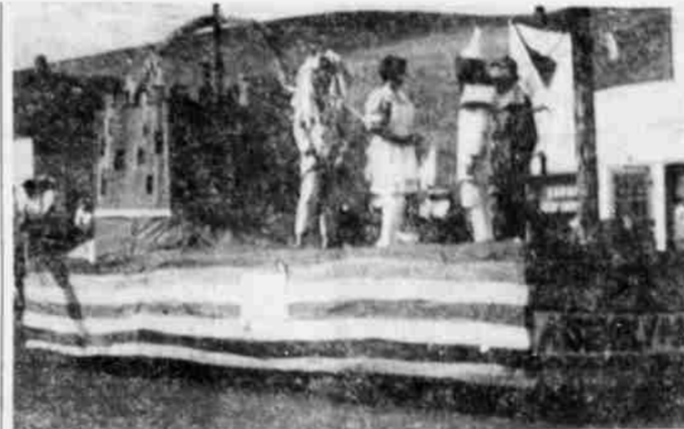
FAIR AND RODEO

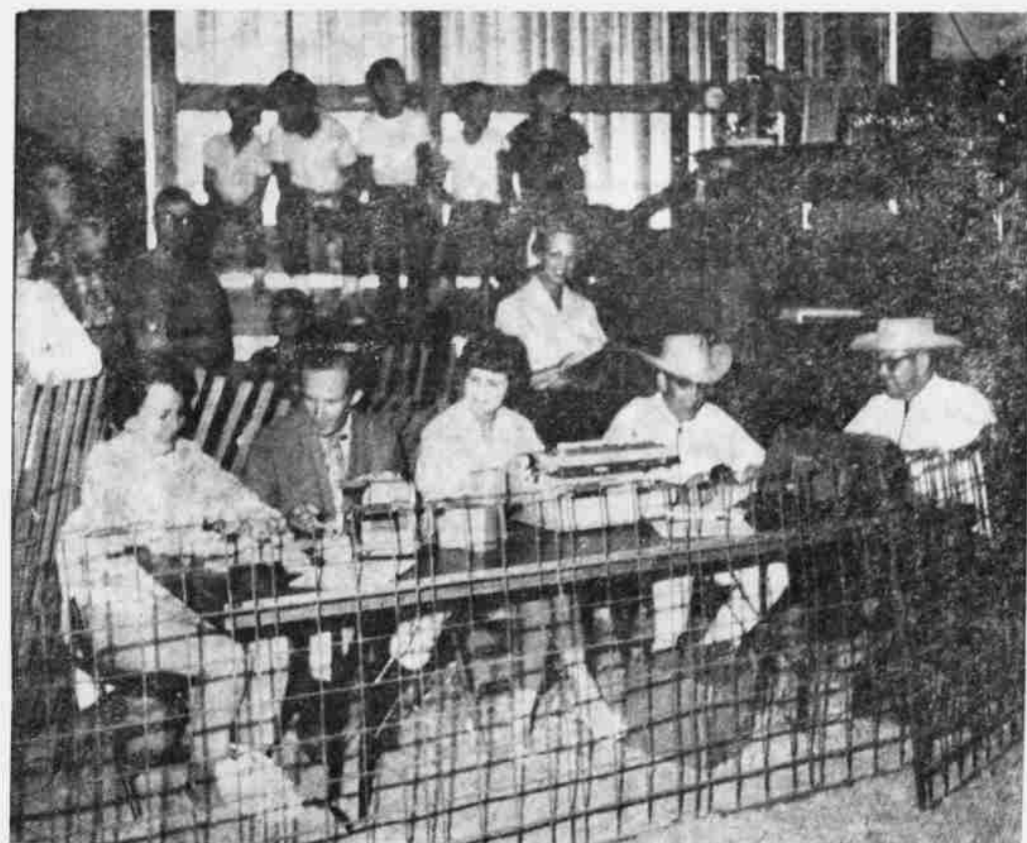
