Driver Applicants Must be Identified

Beginning September 1, all applicants for original Oregon driver licenses must present positive proof of identification prior to obtaining application forms.

The new regulation is designed to prevent falsification of license applications, reduce age discrepancies, especially on minors' licenses, and aid in establishing a permanent driver license number system based on birthdays.

Vern L. Hill, Director of the Department of Motor Vehicles, said the new regulation was currently being used in more than 20 states.

Under the new requirement, any applicant must produce positive proof of identification when applying for an original driver's license or an instruction permit. Any applicant under 21 years old must also produce proof of age.

A drivers license examiner will be on duty in Heppner Tuesday, September 13, at the courthouse between the hours of 9:30 a.m. and 3:30 p.m., according to an announcement received from the Department of Motor Vehicles of Oregon.

The Cowboys Main Street show is called uninhibited western entertainment, with gun fights, fiddling and horseshoe contests and a whopping big medicine show.

Nagley said all the contracts have not been returned, but several of this year's Main Street acts have been signed including a new musical group from Medford who call themselves the Caballeros with a "Tijuana Sound". The group is composed of nine boys between the ages of 15 and 17 who comprise a brass band.

Back again this year will be Loyd Manzer, the champion left-handed fiddler from Caldwell, Idaho; a square dance group from the Country Cousins; the Pendleton Rangers Junior Drum and Bugle Corps, the Athena Highland Scotties, and one-act dramas to be produced by the Pendleton Community Theatre group.

John Conroy, director of the Medicine Show, reports he has lined up a new kind of variety show. There will be more dancers this year and Leo Liebs musical group will feature "The Song Bird of the West" vocalists Dolores Patterson of Pilot Rock.
