IONE—The Rev. Dr. Henry Reifschneider of Minneapolis, Minn., a "missioner" for the United Church Board for World Ministries, will speak at the lone United Church of Christ on Wednesday evening, October 5, at 7:30 on the overseas work of the United Church of Christ.

In 1965 Dr. Reifschneider made a round-the-world study tour of the church's work in Ghana, Hawaii, Japan, Okinawa, Taiwan, the Philippines, Hong Kong, Bangkok, India, Egypt, Lebanon, Greece, and Italy.

Dr. Reifschneider attended Elmhurst College in Illinois and was graduated from Washington University, St. Louis, Mo., with a B.A. degree. He received his Bachelor of Divinity degree from Eden Theological Seminary, Webster Groves, Mo., and a Master's Degree from Marietta (Ohio) College. Elmhurst College has awarded him the Doctor of Divinity Degree. He is vice-president of the board of directors of United Theological Seminary of the Twin Cities; St. Lucas Home for the Aged, Fairbault, Minn., and Congregational Homes, Inc., Pomona, Calif.
