The engine quit and after two diving attempts to get it started failed, he glided the plane through the clouds, saw the highway and made his landing.

State Police Officer Dryman reported that Round made a good landing, but his wing tip hit a tree and flipped the plane into the trees. Round was wearing a seat belt, was uninjured and walked away from the plane.
