A grand total of \$50,000 in awards will be made. In addition to the \$25,000 first prize, eight world division semi-finalist prizes of \$1,000 cach will be given and those eight semi-finalists will also get travel expense to Chicago, Ill., in July, 1967. At that time, the first prize winner will be chosen from the eight. Also, more than 20,000 local, district and multiple district awards will be made.
