

March of Dimes Leaders Named For County Work

New campaign director for the 1967 Morrow County March of Dimes campaign will be Mrs. Marion Green. Mrs. James Prock will lead the Mother's March activities for the campaign.

The two leaders, along with Mrs. Len Ray Schwarz, chapter chairman for Morrow county, were in Portland recently to attend pre-campaign meetings. The two-day sessions provided instruction for volunteer leaders from Oregon, Washington, Idaho, Montana and Alaska. The group was privileged to hear Dr. Virginia Apgar, director of Congenital malformations for the National Foundation for the March of Dimes. She pointed out that only 7 per cent of the public knows what the March of

Dimes is doing now that polio is under control. The public should be made aware that their contributions will go toward research and treatment of birth defects, which is 10 times the number of polio cases.

Some birth defects can be detected and treated during the early months of pregnancy. This makes pre-natal care a vital factor in preventing and controlling birth defects. Many chapters are starting pre-natal clinics, manned by volunteers.

A highlight of the meetings was a trip to the University of Oregon Medical School. Here the group heard an interesting talk by Dr. Neil Buisit, March of Dimes research scientist, tell of some of the advancements and findings in birth defects. He had three patients with defects and explained how they discovered their problem and what they are doing to help them.

The chapter will soon have slides available on this subject and what is being done at the March of Dimes treatment centers. These will be available to groups and organizations, and can be obtained by contacting chapter members, Mrs. Ralph Kincaid, education chairman, or Mrs. Schwarz.
