ESTIMATE OF FINANCIAL EFFECTS: This amendment to Article XI-F(1) and repeal of Article XI-G would reduce the bonding limit for Higher Education and community college building projects from \$134,750,000 to \$104,750,000. It would also remove the present \$5,000,000 limitation on indebtedness for community colleges within the total bonding capacity. The potential average annual cost for principal and interest on bonded indebtedness would be reduced by approximately \$1,750,000. The indebtedness under both articles now totals \$68,000,000.
