Marsha Sowell In Top 2% on Test

Marsha Sowell has received a letter from the National Merit Scholarship Committee commending her on her high performance on the 1966 Qualifying Test, which she took last spring.

Also receiving the Letter of Commendation was Linda K. Clark, formerly a student at HHS and now in her high school senior year at La Grande.

Both girls are among 38,000 students in the United States who scored in the upper two per cent of those graduating from high school in 1967. These students rank just below the 14,000 Semifinalists announced earlier this month by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC), one of whom is HHS' Martha Peck.

Marsha expects to attend the University of Oregon and work in the field of anthropology.

Farm, Town Dwellers Share Dinner Awards

Farmers and city residents shared in honors and awards presented at the annual Farm-City banquet in the multipurpose room of Heppner High school Wednesday evening, held at the conclusion of the day-long annual meeting of the Morrow County Livestock Growers association.

Barton and Ned Clark were presented as Livestock Men of the Year for 1966 by Dick Wilkinson, chairman of the selection committee, and Bill McClintock was recognized as Conservation Man of the Year by Raymond French, chairman of the board of supervisors for the Heppner Soil and Water Conservation district.

Water Fight Must Be Avoided, Mann Tells Stockmen

The Pacific Northwest must avoid a showdown fight on the question of water diversion to the Southwest, but rather must amass such an overwhelming case for using the water here that objective observers will accept it, Rep. Irvin Mann told the Morrow county Livestock Growers association at their annual meeting here Wednesday.

Mann listed Oregon's Ultimate Water Needs study, a National Water Commission, participation in the Western States Water Council, the Columbia Basin Commission, and the newly-formed Columbia Plateau Resources Council as the bases for a five-pronged effort to prepare this case. The Columbia Plateau council encompasses Idaho, Oregon and Washington individuals and organizations.

"If we get into a fight, we'll lose because we don't have the votes the southwest has," Mann said, "but if we gather the data to make an overwhelming case for our side, we'll win without a fight."

Some 40 livestock growers were in attendance at the all-day meeting, which was culminated with the Farm-City Banquet in the Heppner High school multipurpose room Wednesday night with Reuben Long as speaker and Stewart Patty as master of ceremonies.

Larry Williams, president of the Oregon Cattlemen's association, told the stockmen during the day of plans for the state convention which started today (Thursday) in Pendleton. Also telling of the plans was Vern Atwood, executive secretary of the state association.

Larry Lindsay, president of the county association, presided at the meeting. Business highlights included committee reports and election of officers.

Max F. Buschke, 65-Year Resident Taken by Death

Max Fred Buschke, 71, a resident of Heppner for 65 years, died unexpectedly Saturday, apparently from a sudden heart attack. He had been observed by friends downtown Friday and seemed to be in cheerful spirits.

Recitation of the rosary was at St. Patrick's church Tuesday, November 1, at 7:30 p.m., and requiem mass was Wednesday, November 2, at 10 a.m. in St. Patrick's church with Rev. Raymond Beard celebrant.

Vault interment was in Heppner Masonic cemetery with ritualistic services being conducted by BPOE No. 358.

Born August 10, 1888, in The Dalles area, he came to Heppner with his parents as a young boy, remaining here since. Mr. Buschke worked for the U. S. Forest Service for 14 years and for Kinzua Corporation for 17 years before retiring about three years ago.

He was married to Grace Miller in Heppner on May 27, 1928. Mrs. Buschke operates Mill-Ladies Apparel with Mrs. Carey Hastings and following his retirement, Mr. Buschke had helped with some of the maintenance duties at the store.

He was a member of Heppner Elks lodge No. 358 and was a member of St. Patrick's Catholic church.

Besides his wife, Mrs. Grace Buschke, he is survived by a son, Delmer Buschke of Heppner; two daughters, Mrs. Joyce (Glen) Ward of Heppner and Mrs. Carol Shipp of Connell, Wash.; four brothers, Claude Buschke of Heppner, Ed Buschke of Ione, Fred Buschke of Elgin and Bill Buschke of Glendale; five sisters, Mrs. Ann Fehmerling of Seaview, Wash., Mrs. Mary Travis of Westport, Wash., Mrs. Martha Carr of Lincoln City, Mrs. Grace Kari of Pendleton and Mrs. Millie Evans of Heppner; seven grandchildren; and numerous nieces and nephews in Oregon, Washington and California.
