A 950-lb. polled Hereford, raised and entered by Steve Wagenblast, won reserve grand champion FFA honors in the Pacific International Exposition in Portland last month. He was sold for the third highest price, at 43¢ lb., to the Imperial Hotel of Portland, and Steve was presented a handsome trophy for his champion steer. There were about 250 steers entered in the FFA division.

Grand champion steer was entered by Appleland Angus Farms of Yakima, and sold for a top price of \$3,035 lb.

In FFA competition, Steve was reserve grand champion in beef showmanship and placed second in herdsman'ship. He was also presented a trophy from the Oregon Pollettes for best polled steer in FFA in the show.

"We've passed the day when we can ignore these problems," he said. "Some people say, 'Cut out foreign aid.' But changes in transportation and communication have made the world too small. We're the leader of the Free World."

Ullman expressed confidence that the economy would be brought back into balance.

"There's no need for 'boom or bust' any more. We have the answers. We're going to use them."

He said that he plans to introduce a new approach to foreign aid in Congress, proposing industrial combinations work with foreign countries, starting with food producing industries. The old system, he said, furnished a useful purpose.

"The Iron Curtain didn't clank around Italy, France, Turkey and others as it might have."

He added, "Communism is not an alternative. It's a dead end street. But to the peoples of the world, it looks like an alternative."

In conclusion, he said, "It's a exciting time. This old world isn't going to wrack and ruin. We're moving too rapidly, but how much better that is than stagnation."

He recalled the time, not so long ago, that everyone was talking about bomb shelters, but this now is pretty well forgotten. Concern over Red China has lessened, too.

"We don't know exactly what's going on there, but we know a major revolution is in progress."

He called Oregon a land of opportunity and said that it is receiving its share of federal programs, adding "This economy can't help but grow and be strong."

The congressman had words of praise for other Democratic candidates, and urged all to work for Bob Duncan for senator.

"He is one of the most able legislators I know of," he said. As to Bob Straub for governor, Ullman said that the experts at one time said he shouldn't win but now say that he could.

Acknowledges Candidates
He recognized each of the local Democratic candidates. Although he has opposition

Ten Candidates On Lone Ballot

Ten candidates are listed on the lone city ballot for the election to be held in the city hall here on Tuesday, November 8, from 8 a.m. until 8 p.m.

Three of the six offices to be filled find candidates running without opposition on the ballot. Jim Barnett, appointed mayor or some time ago to fill the vacancy left when Charles O'Connor resigned, is running unopposed for election to that post.

Lillian Boyce is candidate for city treasurer and June Crowder seeks reelection as city recorder. All these positions are for two year terms.

Seven candidates are on the ballot for the three council positions open. All the terms are for four years. Running are Ray Boyce, Bill Rietmann, Hugh Salter, Bob Drake, Howard Crowell, Laurel Cannon and Herb Eastrom, Jr.

Faenicle copy of the city ballot is printed elsewhere in this paper for information and study by voters.

from Everett Thoren of Elgin, a Republican, in the general election, Ullman never once alluded to his opponent or the fact that he faced a contest.

Mrs. Virginia Rosewall, chairman of the Morrow county Democratic Central committee, introduced Ullman, saying that he was a congressman who brought Washington, D. C., "as near as your telephone." She said, "We will send you back to Congress as long as you care to go."

Ullman responded by saying that Mrs. Rosewall, as party chairman here, is doing a job of which Al Lamb would be "mighty proud."

that he would bring youthful vigor and energy to the office.

E. O. (Gene) Ferguson, Republican incumbent, is opposed by Jack VanWinkle, Democrat, for the office of county commissioner. Like the assessor candidates, both men are life-long residents here and are well-known throughout the county. Ferguson says that he is working for the present as well as for the future of the county. VanWinkle has a platform to support the Willow Creek project and irrigation developments.

Because of the developments underway in the north end of the county and on the Columbia River waterfront, the offices of port commissioner are more important and have attracted more interest this year. Five candidates are on the ballot for two positions. Three seek the two 4-year positions. They are Garland Swanson of Lone, Republican incumbent, Joe Tatom of Boardman, Democratic incumbent, and J. R. (Barney) Malcom of Heppner, who won both Democratic and Republican nominations in the primaries.

Interested in Development
Competing for the one 2-year term as port commissioner are Harry O'Donnell of Heppner, Democratic incumbent, and Oscar Peterson of Lone, former county judge, Republican. O'Donnell was appointed to the commission to fill a vacancy

and is presently serving. Peterson was nominated for the position by the Morrow county Republican central committee and his name was not on the ballot in the primaries. He states that he has been vitally interested in development in the northern part of the county and helped initiate some of these developments as county judge. O'Donnell also states that he is very much interested in the progress of the county and its waterfront development and points to a good knowledge of the county through his work as owner of the Morrow County Abstract and Title Co. O'Donnell adds that he has had a close working relationship with the county court.

Back on the national scene, Congressman Al Ullman, Democrat, of Baker is opposed by Everett Thoren, Republican, of Elgin. Thoren has conducted an ardent campaign for election to the second congressional district seat, but Ullman has done little pre-election work, running on his record.

Several Without Opposition
Other positions on the ballot are without opposition. Herman W. Winter, Republican and Democratic nominations in May, for Morrow county district attorney. He has served in this capacity since he came to the county four years ago.

Norman O. Nilsen, Democrat, is unopposed for the position of Oregon Commissioner of the Bureau of Labor, and Leon P. Minear is without opposition on the nonpartisan ballot for state superintendent of public instruction.

Circuit Judge William W. Wells, who serves Morrow and Umatilla counties in the sixth

judicial district, is without opposition for reelection, as are others on the judiciary ballot. They include William C. Berry, for judge of the State Supreme Court, position No. 4; Alfred T. Goodwin, for judge of the Supreme Court, position No. 5; and Edward H. Howell, formerly of John Day and now of Salem, for judge of the Oregon Tax Court. He is presently serving in this capacity and is well known and highly respected here.

Two measures are on the ballot, both getting there by referral to the people from the legislature. Measure No. 1 would require public bodies taking over public transportation systems to protect pension rights and job benefits of employees and retired employees. Measure No. 2 concerns state bonds for education facilities. (For editorial comment on these, see page 2).
