

History of Famous Jewels Discussed On Club Program

A display of replicas of famous diamonds provided the subject for an interesting discussion of "Famous Jewels" by Randall Peterson on the program of the Heppner Mother's club at its meeting Monday evening. The club met at the home of Mrs. Robert Abrams, with Mrs. J. G. Stephens assisting the hostess.

Behind each of the world's famous diamonds is a background of historical significance, the speaker pointed out. The jeweler displayed replicas of such diamonds as the Hope, the Shah, the Orloff, the Pigott, the Polar Star, Florentine, Great Mogul, Kohinoor, Jubilee, Regent, Southern Star, all of great worth and rich in historical significance.

Although diamonds were first found in India in the rough, 98% of those of greatest worth have come from mines in South Africa. Some were found over 200 years ago, but in 1945 a 700-carat diamond was found in South Africa. Like gold and other precious metals, they were used as a valuable medium of exchange between nations, and treasured by nobility, especially during the reign of Napoleon and periods of the English empire. One of special interest in the display was the Hope diamond, a sapphire blue 45-carat, valued at between \$150,000 and \$175,000 and now on exhibit in Washington, D. C. Many of the precious gems now rest in museums or among nobility in Europe and England.

Mr. Peterson discussed the importance of faceting or cutting the diamonds to get the highest brilliance, also of their comparative weights and values and the present day successes in developing synthetic gems.
