Visual Aid Use In Counties Told At PTA By McCullough

IONE—Guest speaker for the November meeting of the Lone PTA last Thursday evening at the cafeteria was Charles McCullough of the Institutional Materials Center of Umatilla and Morrow counties in Pendleton.

He gave a most interesting talk on his work as director of the center and invited the school patrons to visit the office at any time and see the wealth of visual aid material that is made available to the schools on a loan basis. Delivery is made to all the schools in the two counties every week and teachers may choose from the catalog the materials they wish to use with their students.

The center is financed by the federal government to supplement the visual aids which the schools have. The three-year program will take about \$500,000 before the program is completed. It is hoped to have educational television in the classrooms of each school by the last year of the program.

Mr. McCullough had a table of things from the center on display. Large plastic models, excellent maps of all types, tape recorder, overhead projectors, film strips with small records, movie projectors, many movies on every subject, musical records, and many other materials are ready on a "first come, first served" basis for the teachers. The school also had some new visual aids on display in the gymnasium.
