Eating someone else's cook Lating someone class cooking is usually a freat or a wel-come change. This was espec-ially true at the program "Low Cost Adventures in Good Eat-ing" held November 16 at the Fair Annex in Heppner.

Those attending enjoyed the Tasting Party, where everyone sampled the food prepared by the members of the County Extension Committee.

A variety of low cost cuts of meat was used in preparing the dishes—ground beef, stew meat (beef), beef tongue and brains, dried beef, and chicken.

The demonstrations included such ideas as how to cut a 7 lb. chuck blade roast before it is cooked to make three meals without having "planned-overs"; how to prepare "Sheepherders' Potatoes," a camper's or hunter's favorite, and how to prepare "Chicken Loaf." The main pare 'Chicken Loaf.' The main thing to remember in cooking meat, and especially the less tender ones, is to use low heat 300 to 325 degrees F for oven, as excessive heat causes meat to become tough and causes the piece of meat to shrink too much in size.
