## Christmas Tree Permits Required

Individual permits for removal of Christmas trees from National Forest lands are required, and are now available from the office of the Heppner Ranger district, according to announcement by Jack Kreiger.

Permits are now being issued between the hours of 8 a.m. and 5 p.m., Monday through Saturday, at the district office in the Gilliam and Bisbee building. Maps are available at the office showing the designated cutting area which is west of the entrance to Bull Prairie on Highway 207.

A charge of \$1 will be made for individual use of Christmas trees removed from the Umatilla National Forest. Special arrangements may be made by schools, churches, or organizations by contacting the forest service offices.
