

## Big 4th Quarter Brings Cardinals Win Over Pirates

A 22 point scoring splurge in the fourth quarter gave the lone High basketball team victory over Riverside on the Pirates' floor Friday night, 56 to 50. Frank Halvorsen burned the basket with 14 points in the period, and by himself doubled Riverside's entire production for the quarter. The Pirates managed only seven points in the stanza.

Riverside had a nine-point margin, 43 to 34, going into the quarter. After having a good first half and an intermission margin of 10 points, 36 to 26, the Pirates went cold and could get only four field goals in the second half.

Jim Swanson, who had 19 points for the evening, contributed to the withering attack of the Cards in the fourth quarter, getting six points. The scoring of Halvorsen, who had 22 in the game, and Swanson was aided by the ball hawking of Eddie Sherman and Bob Ball.

The Pirates had taken a 15-13 lead in the first quarter and seemed to have the game in their pockets by halftime when the never-say-die young team of the Cards came on with a rush.

Ione had 13 turnovers in the game to 12 for Riverside. The Cardinals shot 370 from the field while the Pirates hit 280. Ione made 12 of 28 at the free throw line in the league game and Riverside made 18 of 24.

## Bad 4th Quarter Gives Cards Loss To Weston Quint

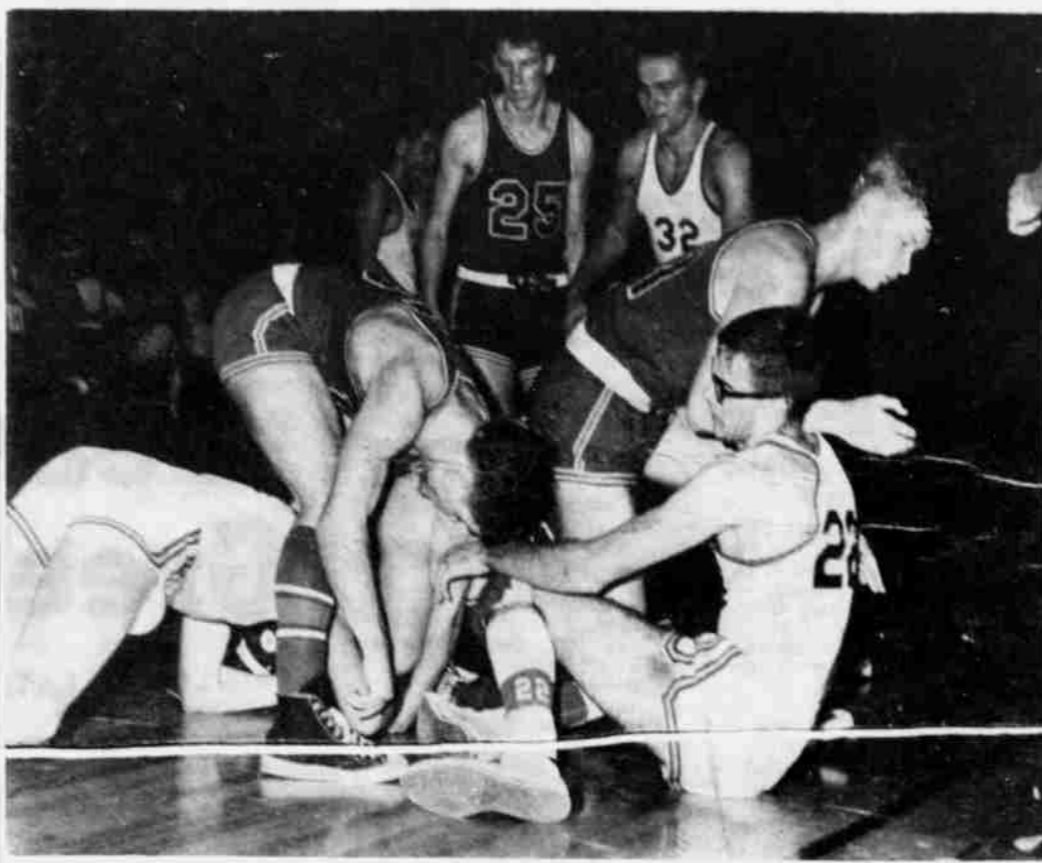
Ione High's basketball team, which had whipped Riverside the previous night on a hot fourth quarter, lost to Weston on a reversal Saturday night at Ione, 40 to 33. The Cardinals had held an edge against the Tigers through most of the game but went cold while Weston came on strong at the end of the game.

Coach Gene Dockter's lads led at the end of the first quarter, 14 to 8, and clung to a one-point advantage at halftime, 21 to 20. They still held the one point going into the fourth quarter, 25 to 24, but Weston came on with 16 points while Ione could make only eight, and there went the ball game for the Cardinals.

Ione's field goal shooting was only 25% while Weston connected for 43%. Yet the Cardinals made one more field goal than the visitors, 14 to 13. Ione had only five of 13 on the free throw line while Weston banked 14 of 28. Seven turnovers in the third quarter really hurt the Cardinals, and it was just this juncture that the Tigers got hot, making 50% of their attempts from the floor in the second half.

## Heppner Hoopers Make it Two Wins Over DeSales Five

The Heppner Mustangs, surviving cold shooting from the floor, made up for it at the free throw line and defeated the DeSales Irish again Saturday evening. The score of the game, played at Walla Walla, was 67-55.

It was Heppner's big boy, Mac Hoskins, who combined with junior guard Bill McLeod to bring the Mustangs the win. Hoskins dumped in 19 points while McLeod was getting 15. Dave Hall was close behind at 14 points.

Big men for the Irish were John McCormick with 12 and Mike Levens with 15 points. Dennis Gowan also was in double figures with 10.

The teams traded baskets through most of the first period but the Mustangs managed to squeeze ahead at the break, 18-14. Heppner kept up the pace in the second quarter as they pulled to an 8-point lead at the half.

The Irish outscored the Mustangs 18-12 in the third quarter to come within two points. Then Heppner took advantage of numerous chances at the charity line and snatched the game from the grasp of the Irish. They added another 10 points to their margin but didn't quite match the 75-57 score of their first encounter with DeSales.

## Mustangs Square Condon Series With 60-51 Win

"We got 'em back!" was an exclamation you might have heard from Heppner basketball fans here late Friday night.

That was the story as the Mustangs captured a victory from the rough Condon bunch, 60-51, after the Blue Devils beat them out by two points the week before. The Devils once led by seven at the end of the first quarter but that was short-lived. Heppner gained back the lead in the second quarter and was never headed thereafter. Condon, however, gave the Mustangs a scare, coming within two points at the end of the third quarter and within one point midway through the fourth.

Coach Bob Clough's starting line-up was changed Friday night with Steve Pettyjohn and Bill McLeod getting a crack at the opening whistle. Jim Jacobs, Mac Hoskins, and Jim Doherty, all two-year lettermen, made up the rest of the starters.

McLeod, showing great promise as a junior, popped in 16 tallies. He hit mostly from the side, taking nice easy jumpers about three feet off the floor. Hoskins, who led all scoring with 19 points, did a great job on the boards and helped Heppner pull away late in the fourth quarter. He played his usual balanced game.

Early in the third quarter the Condon boys thought they saw some light as they happily watched Heppner's flashy senior guard, Jim Doherty, bow out on fouls. Heppner fans began to worry. But Dave Hall came off the bench and added a quick 8 points, then Hoskins hit a few. McLeod and Jacobs each scored again and Heppner started pulling away.

From a slim 37-35 lead at third quarter time, the Devils once made the score board read 43-

42 with Heppner just hanging on. Then the Mustangs lead got bigger—two, three, points bigger—with time running out. Heppner played ball control and built up a 6-point lead, then all they did was wait until the time ran out to finish with a 60-51 victory.

Jim Jacobs, showing what he really can do, found the hoops for 12 counters, hitting his high for the season.

## Four Face Charges Of Taking Auto

Four persons, including three juveniles and Terry Campbell, 20, of Heppner, face charges of taking and using an automobile without permission after the auto of Pat Doherty, was found abandoned near the county fair grounds early last Thursday morning.

Campbell was arrested Monday and was arraigned in court of Justice of the Peace Earl Seward. Ball was set at \$1500 and Campbell was taken to the Pendleton jail while awaiting action of the grand jury.

A state police officer said that the three juveniles, ages 11, 13 and 14, and living in Heppner and Lexington, will appear at a later time before County Judge Paul Jones, who acts as juvenile judge.

The four allegedly took a car belonging to Doherty, drove it to Juniper canyon and got it stuck there. Irvin Rauch, not realizing that the car had been taken without permission, helped them get it out, the state officer said. The four then allegedly drove to Heppner, proceeding into the rodeo grounds and finally drove it into a tree. It sustained considerable damage in the crash.

Both city and state officers investigated the incident, resulting in the arrest of Campbell and the apprehension of the three juveniles.
