Heppner High Senior Named Homemaker Of Tomorrow Winner

Barbara Bloodsworth, Heppner High school senior, ranked first in a written homemaking knowledge and attitude test given to senior girls December 6 and becomes Heppner High school's 1967 Betty Crocker Homemaker of Tomorrow. It has been announced. Registered for the test were 581,334 girls in 14,753 of the nation's high schools, a new record for the 13 years the program has been offered by General Mills, its sponsors.

Barbara will be awarded a specially designed silver charm, and she remains in contention for state and national scholarship awards, ranging from \$500 to \$5,000.

In the program's next step, a state Homemaker of Tomorrow will be selected from winners in all schools of the state. She will receive a \$1,500 college scholarship, and her school will be given a set of Encyclopedia Britannica by Encyclopedia Britannica, Inc. The state runner-up's award will be a \$500 scholarship.

Following her selection, the State Homemaker of Tomorrow, together with a school advisor, will join winners and advisors from each of the 49 other states and the District of Columbia in an expense-paid educational tour of Colonial Williamsburg, Va., and Washington, D. C. Climax of the trip will be the naming of the 1967 Betty Crocker All-American Homemaker of Tomorrow.

Chosen from the state winners on the basis of her original test score, plus personal observation and interviews during the tour, she will receive a scholarship increased to \$5,000. Grants of second-, third- and fourth-ranking girls in the nation will be raised to \$4,000, \$3,000 and \$2,000 respectively.

All judging is conducted by Science Research Associates, Chicago. This educational testing and publishing firm also constructs and grades the written test.

Started during the 1954-55 school year, the Betty Crocker Search for the American Homemaker of Tomorrow is designed to emphasize the importance of homemaking as a career. More than 5 million girls have participated in the program since it began and, with 1967 awards added, scholarships granted have exceeded \$1.3 million.

Principals Inform Club on Proposals

"Our primary concern is to help see that our children receive the best education possible," Principal Dick Carpenter told members and guests of the Soroptimist club at its luncheon meeting last Thursday.

Mr. Carpenter, high school principal, and Alan Martin, elementary school principal, were guests of the club and presented an interesting discussion on the proposed reorganization of the school system into a six-six plan. They were introduced by Mrs. Wes Sherman, program chairman, following other introductions of guests, Pam McCabe and Barbara Bloodsworth, high school seniors, and Mrs. Roice Fullerton.

Information sheets, "The Six-Year High School in Oregon," put out by the state education department, were distributed and used by the principals as a basis for stating strengths and weaknesses for putting the proposed plan into effect here. Also included was a list of some 13 six-year high schools who are operating satisfactorily within Oregon at the present time.

Principal Martin called attention to present crowded conditions and inadequacies in the building constructed 54 years ago, now used for upper grades. "Statistics show that the average useful life of a school is about 40 years," he pointed out. "We are moving 154 students every 45 minutes through very

crowded space," he continued, and stressed the fact that the new program would help greatly in more nearly balancing the student load.

Advantages of enlarged curriculum at no extra cost to the budget, better utilization of specially trained teachers and more efficient use of school facilities were among some of the advantages discussed. A period of questions and answers closed the program.
