Warren Essay Judged Winner in Rexburg Lions' Peace Contest

Steve Warren, freshman at Ricks College in Rexburg, Idaho, will represent the Rexburg Lions club as its entry in Lions International's \$50,000 Peace Essay Contest. He is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Paul Warren of Heppner, and a 1966 graduate of Heppner High school.

As first place winner, Warren won the right from a large num-ber of entries, and will now en-ter the district level of judging, en route to the grand prize. His essay was the unanimous choice of a panel of three judges, Nor-val Bigler, Mrs. Glen Bean and Mrs. Frank Jacobs.

The contest, which is the largest Peace Contest in the world, was initiated to stimu-late and elicit the views of to-day's youth on peace. A total of \$50,000 in awards will be made, including a first prize of \$25,000 in educational and or career assistance grant, eight semi-finalist awards of \$1,000, and travel expenses to Chicago, Ill., for these semi-finalists in July, 1967. At that time, the first prize winner will be cho-sen from the eight. Also, more than 20,000 local, district and multiple district awards will be made.

Last Thursday, Warren was dinner guest of the Rexburg Lions club, at which time he was presented a framed gold certificate and a pen with his name engraved upon it.

Also, a news release from Ricks College has listed Warren on the first semester honor roll. Students must maintain a 3.5 grade point average or above to be eligible for the honor roll.
