

Port Commission Informed On Atomic Reactor Plant

BOARDMAN—Richard Corlett from the Battelle Institute at Richland, Wash., spoke to the Morrow County Port Commission here last week on the construction of nuclear reactors, his firm having been contracted by the Bonneville Power to make a study of areas where these could be constructed. The first one is to be built in 1970, with possibly one more each year in the northwest.

He stated requirements were distance from population centers, geology, and the availability of cooling water. Cost of construction is about \$130,000,000 and it employs about 60 people when completed.

Also present was Ken Coryell from the Corps of Engineers at Walla Walla to work out the Port's land acquisition program. The port is working with the Corps and the Union Pacific Railroad to retain a railroad spur in the Port's property.

Present at the meeting were County Judge Paul Jones, Clarence Rosewall, chairman of the county planning commission; Wayne Cordes of Portland, port attorney; Rupert Kennedy, Mid-Columbia Planning Council, and port commissioners Oscar Peterson, Dick Krebs, Gar Swanson, Barney Malcom and Dewey West.

It is issued for producing water meeting the state board of health standards for bacteriological purity of drinking water during the year of 1966.

Personal property taxpayers are required to file a return of taxable property as of January 1, 1967 with the Assessor on or before March 2, 1967. A penalty is provided for late filing.

Inventory owners (including all livestock) will again be eligible for a reduction of property tax this year if the return is filed on time. The law does not permit the Assessor to allow the reduction in inventory value for tax relief under certain circumstances when the personal property report is not accurately prepared or is filed after March 2.

Any person who has not had an opportunity to report by mail or personal contact may obtain the forms at the office of the assessor.

Time is getting short. ORS 308.290 makes it the responsibility of the taxpayer to file these reports on time or incur the penalty provided by law.
