He believes this to be a good guideline for us to examine so that Oregon will not fall into the same errors, but could profit by their mistakes and develop a better program here. Mr. O'Rourke is hopeful that a Columbia River Commission and Water District will be established soon to study the project. KINZUA — Mrs. Della M. Smith, 86, former resident of Kinzua, died Tuesday, February 7, at the Clarkston, Wash. Rest Haven where she had resided since suffering a stroke three years ago. She was the widow of Ludlow Smith, an Eastern Oregon grain farmer. She had lived at Clarkston since 1952.

Mrs. Smith was born September 20, 1880, on a farm near Kansas City and came with her parents, David and Mary Shaw, to Gilliam County when she was four. She was married to Lud Smith on December 23, 1896, at Condon and they farmed in the Condon and Mayville areas until moving to Portland during World War I. In the early 1930's they moved to Kinzua where Mr. Smith was a night watchman for about 20 years before moving to Clarkston. Mr. Smith passed away September 20, 1959.

State Commission Offers Tax Help

Assistance in preparing Oregon state income tax returns will be given by State Tax Commission personnel at the courthouse in Heppner on March 9 from 10:30 a.m. to 12 noon.

Taxpayers wishing help in filing their returns are asked to bring earnings slips and other information needed to determine the correct tax, including, if possible, a copy of their federal return filed for the 1966 tax year.

The Tax Commission points out that in order to be eligible for a refund a taxpayer must file a return. Refunds are issued on a "first come, first served" basis.

It is also emphasized that if a joint return is filed, both spouses must sign it.

Deadline for filing is April 17.
