

Student Gives Talk On U. N. Objectives To Soroptimist Club

Objectives of the United Nations and its importance for the future as a "keeper of peace" were the substance of an interesting talk by Merrill Jacobs, Heppner High school junior, presented on the program of the Soroptimist club at its luncheon meeting last Thursday noon.

The speech was one prepared by Miss Jacobs for competition in the District United Nation Pilgrimage contest held at the IOOF hall in Pendleton on March 5.

Other guests introduced were Maralee Murray and Nonda Clark, high school seniors.

Many accomplishments of the United Nations, since its organization in 1945, were included in the talk by Miss Jacobs. She told how membership had increased from 51 nations at its beginning in 1945 to the present 121 member nations and how it is looking forward in helping to bring about among nations a "better future without hunger, illiteracy, disease and war."

She pointed out one of the U.N.'s most important accomplishments in 1966 was the banning of use of nuclear weapons in space by nations. Also its role in bringing aid to the underdeveloped countries of the world through "WHO", the World Health Organization, was emphasized, as well as its promoting social programs and better standards of life in basic freedom in education through UNESCO.

Miss Terry Linecum, art instructor in the Heppner schools, was welcomed into the club as a new member at the club's business meeting on March 2.

Among committee reports given was announcement by Mrs. Conley Lanham, youth committee chairman, that Maralee Murray had been announced as winner of this year's citizen essay contest, and her entry has been placed in district competition.
