Zoning Ordinance Baffles City Dads

City councilmen, still trying to get adjusted to provisions and ramifications of the new zoning ordinance that they passed last year, were somewhat baffled as to how to act on two of four building permit applications presented to them at their Monday night meeting.

Dick Robison applied to construct a 4-unit trailer court on North Chase between Inland Chemical Company and Parrish Garage, and councilmen, noting the need for more standard trailer space, appeared inclined to look upon the application with favor.

They found, however, that it is in a commercial zone. Trailer courts are neither permitted as outright nor conditional uses in a commercial zone.

City Attorney Bob Abrams expressed the opinion that it would take an amendment to the ordinance to grant the permit, and this would require a public hearing, formal advertising of the hearing and other legal steps.

Again, in the instance of the application of Emile Groshens to add four more apartments to his present building at 169 North Chase, the council learned that this would be a conditional use, and as such would be a variance.

After lengthy discussion, the two applications were turned over to the planning commission for recommendation.

Two other applications, which comply with the zoning ordinance, were granted. They are to Morrow county for construction of a Civil Defense facility in the basement of the courthouse at a cost of \$2000 with Howard Keithley as contractor, and to Bob Pierce for construction of a 20x30 garage at 323 East Linden Way at a cost of \$600.

Resolution Passed

Request to the Highway Commission to improve the Morgan Street extension under a provision of state law that permits the state to make improvements on streets with unusual sudden wear was again made, this time in the form of a resolution.

A motion was also passed

Chest X-Ray Unit Due Next Week

Mobile chest X-ray unit of the Oregon State Board of Health will be in Morrow county next week, the Morrow county Health Department announces. The unit will visit both north and south Morrow county with stops at Boardman, Irrigon, Ione and Heppner.

Members of the Morrow county Council, Oregon TB and Health association, will be volunteer helpers at the visit of the unit in Ione and Heppner. Work hours are being scheduled by Mrs. Marcel Jones, president of the council. Others assisting in planning are Tony Haberlach, program director, Eastern Region, Oregon TB and Health association, and Mrs. Lowell Chally, R. N., Morrow County Health Department.

Everyone is urged to have a chest X-ray yearly for possible early detection of tuberculosis, lung defects and abnormalities of the heart.

Schedule of visits is as follows: April 11, Boardman near city hall, 10 a.m. to 1 p.m.; April 11, Irrigon—A. C. Houghton school, 2 p.m. to 5 p.m.; April 12, Ione—Barnett's Chevrolet Service Station, 2 p.m. to 6 p.m.; April 13, Heppner—Rexall Drug Store, 11 a.m. to 2 p.m. and 3 p.m. to 6 p.m.; April 14, Heppner—Rexall Drug Store, 9 a.m. until noon.

Those who are required to show freedom from tuberculosis for employment or college entrance purposes are reminded that they can obtain chest X-rays at the mobile X-ray survey unit if they wish. Signed parental consent is necessary for those unmarried and under 21. Children are not usually X-rayed unless by doctor's written request, or unless they have a positive tuberculin skin test.

Candidates Short For School Board

Filing deadline for positions on the Morrow county school board passed Friday, and only one petition was presented for the two positions open.

Jack Sumner will be a candidate to succeed himself for a Heppner rural position, but no one filed for the position now held by Kenneth Barry. He did not wish to be a candidate.

Sumner had been appointed to the board to fill an unexpired term and so he will seek election for the first time.

The other position will be filled possibly by write-in vote at the school election to be held on Monday, May 1. This election is not to be confused with the school budget election, which will be Monday, April 17.

The district had a larger slate of candidates for advisory committee positions, but there are no candidates for three of five positions on the Heppner committee. These are for positions now held by Albert Wright, Homer Hughes and Jack Ployhar.

Petitions were completed and submitted for the following candidates:

Ione—Bob Rietmann and Louise Carlson. Boardman—Earl McQuaw. Irrigon—Bill Parker. Heppner—Elden Padberg (Lexington member) and Herman Winter.

Heart Fund Tops Last Year's Drive

Morrow county residents contributed a total of \$836.78 to the Heart Fund in the campaign recently ended, Harley Sager, county chairman, announces.

This surpassed the 1966 total of \$687.14 and the 1965 receipts of \$522.99.

Of that contributed, \$236.51 came from organizations, \$226.45 from business firms in the county, \$68.82 from Heart Sunday collections, and \$305 in donations received through the mail.

By communities, donations were as follows: Heppner, \$328.51; Ione, \$27.70; Hardman, \$20.50; Lexington, \$33; Irrigon, \$51.35; and Boardman, \$70.72. These do not include the mailed contributions of \$305 which came from all parts of the county.

"I wish to thank all community chairmen, their workers and organized groups for their part in the successful campaign, and also all who contributed this year to the very worthwhile charity," Sager said.

Variety of Good Rummage Items Sought for Sale

"Just anything in fairly good condition," will be welcomed by those kindergarten mothers who are working on the annual Civic League spring rummage sale, according to Mrs. Lyle Jensen. Mrs. Jensen, with co-chairman Mrs. Roy Davis, is in charge of the event, scheduled for Friday and Saturday, April 14 and 15, at the Gilliam and Bisbee building.

Although they are very anxious to collect more used clothing, toys, furniture and household objects, the ladies already have quite a stock including an electric stove and a gas-powered lawn mower. In addition they will be able to sell for half-price some Gilliam and Bisbee merchandise, including light switches, paint, garden and house plant supplies.

Civic League members and kindergarten mothers will sort rummage articles tonight (Thursday) and Friday evening and continue each afternoon and evening of next week at the sale location.

Contributors of used goods may bring them to the sorting sessions, leave them at the doorway of the Gilliam and Bisbee building or call the pick-up committee members, Mrs. Jensen (676-9613), Mrs. Joe Balle (676-5510), Mrs. John Mollahan (676-5823) and Mrs. Wes Marlatz (676-5530), all of Heppner; also Mrs. Pat Cutsforth (989-8472), Lexington.

Lexington residents may leave rummage at Del's Market and Ione people may leave it at the post office.

Kindergarten mothers will staff the rummage sale from 9 until 5 on both Friday, April 14, and Saturday, April 15.

Money from the sale will go toward paying the kindergarten teacher's salary and buying kindergarten supplies. Tuition fees do not provide sufficient revenue to keep the kindergarten going and profits from twice-yearly rummage sales make up the difference so that tuition can be kept at the present low rate.

Snow Depth Down, March Survey Shows

Depth of snow at Arbuckle Mountain on March 30 was measured by Ralph Richards at 23 inches, which is 6.6 inches below the 15-year average and 15.8 inches below the 38.8 inches reported at the same time last year. High year was 43 inches in 1955 and low year was 1963 when there was no snow at the end of March.

Water content as of March 30 was eight inches as compared with the average of 11.3 inches. Last year at the same time it was 14 inches and high year was 1953 at 17.1 inches.

Density was 34.75% as of March 30, as compared with 35.75 on March 30, 1966. Fifteen-year density average is 35.58, and high year was in 1960 at 46%.
