At the end of last year's season, Toll held a co-championship at the Speedway, sharing honors with Bill Langford of Pendleton.

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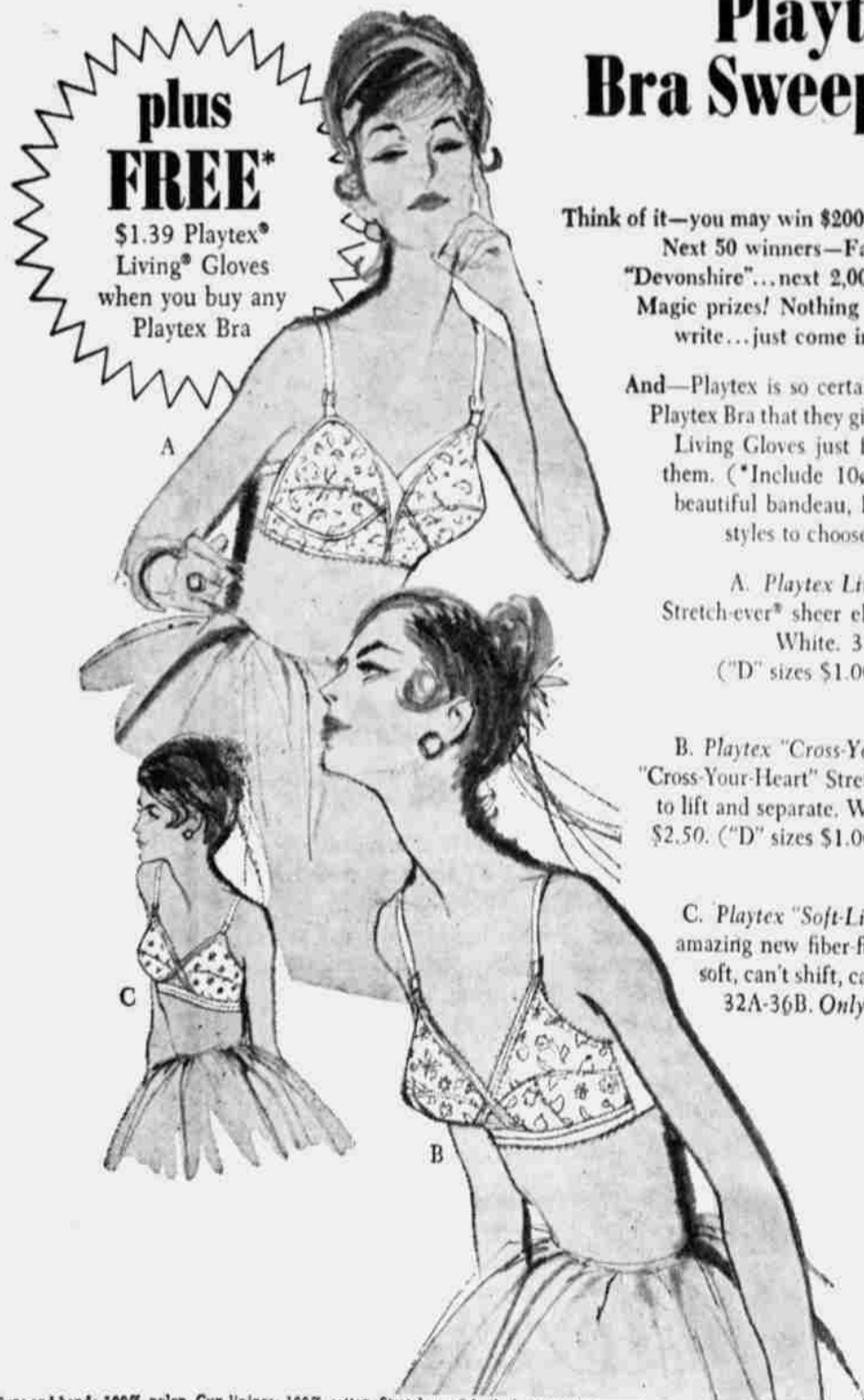
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
